THE PROVINCIAL CONFERENCE. Summary of the Resolutions Passed by the Con-

ference of Premiers at Quebeid No. 1 proposes an amendment to the British North American Act to remove the power of disallowance now vested in the Federal authority, so as to leave those matters on which the Provinces have exclusive jurisdiction subject only to disallowance by the Queen in Council as before

No. 2 proposes the establishment of a statues, both Federal and Provincial, be-

No. 3 would provide that private litiof any statute after two years from its pas-After that time it should be challenged only by a government, and any previous decisions should have full force as if such statute had been constitutionally

No. 4 would amend the Confederation Act so as to limit the term of all Senators. It also proposes that as vacaucies occur in the Senate, the new Senators should be chosen by the Province to which vacant seat belongs, until one half the Province's quota has been filled by such as at present, and this proportion to be

No. 5 would amend the Act so as to secure the independence of Lieutenant Governors from Federal interference and varied forms. She stated that from 7,000 giving them the same statutes as Governors

> No. 6 would forbid the assumption Provincial public works by the Federal power on the plea of their being for the general advantage of Canada, except where such general utility has been declared in the Acts creating them.

> No. 7 provides for the districts and electors for the members of the house of Commons, being those provided by Provincial legislations for the Provincial Legislatures. No. 8 requires the amendment of the B.

> jurisdiction to appoint Stipendiary, Police, and other Magistrates. No. 9 desires amendment, giving all fees from legal proceedings in Provincial Courts to the Provincial treasuries.

No. 10 proposes amendments to give Lieut-Governors of provinces undoubted opponents upon all these and many other power to appoint Courts of Assize Nisi Prins, Oyer and Terminer and general jail

No. 11 would give Provincial Legislatures the same power to regulate the privileges and immunities of their legislators, as the Federal power has to deal with its members, and calls for confirmation by Imperial Statute of Provincial Acts already passed with this object.

No. 12 proposed amendment to enable the Queen-in-Council by proclamation to abolish the Legislative Councils, or to regulate the method of their appointment, on the address of a Legislative Assembly passed by two thirds majority.




