Business men who have not the time or inclination to attend to this part of the business, employ the broker who receives commission But when the poor man, goes direct to the insurance company it seems no more than just that the rebate of commission should

be allowed him, instead of the entire amount of premium exacted, which is always the case and which he is obliged to pay." The San Francisco Journal of Commerce says: The payment of premiums to brokers is necessitated by competition. It would be a great gain for the insured if this could be done without, but at present it cannot, and the company which would charge a business man the full rate and a working man a two third rate would soon have to leave
