OUR DECREASE IN PEREWOOD

To the Editor of the Acton Pass Pass. Sin,-It is often said by farmers, or rather by some, for others know or practice better, that if our wood be used up we can burn coal. I quote the following paragraph as a proof of how badly they may be off in a country which is within hauling distance of coal, but has little timber. Most of Kansas is within about the same distance of a forest country as the older sottled part of Ontario would be if the present small reserves therein were ex-

hausted, as they will be in about fifteen years time at the present rate of use :-There was last week great suffering in Kansas for want of fuel. Much of that state is treeless, and wood is not to be had. Corn is sometimes used there for fuel, but the erop was a failure this year, and the unfortunate settlers were de: prived of that resource against the inclemency of the winter weather. In some counties the inhabitants had nothing to deposed upon but a scanty and uncertain supply of soal. Some of them had to travel thirty, forty and fifty miles to a railway station for coal, duly to find that there was none to be had! The reads were worked to their utmost capacity yet they could not supply all who needed fuck. In one place the cars were stopped by the citizens, who were ready to perish, and they helped themselves to what they wanted. Many persons have been frezen to death, and many who have not actualy perished with cold have endured groat suffer-

ing .:- Montreal STAR. If there were no other reason for keeping up some stock of timber, the mero need of fuel should furnish one. As coal is more needed - say if all our farmers used it-it would be probably dearer, and at all events would cause great trouble and frequent scarcity of the difficulty of providing for as great an extent. The ingral to be found here is that all should set about either preserving their old wood lot by keeping out cattle and filling up gaps, or plant a new one. This spring should see a great impetus given to the tree planting move-
