Some of the prominent Prohibitionists on both sides of the House have been invited to Halton to take part in the campaign against the repeal of the Scott Act.

Judgment was delivered on Monday at Oagoode hall in the West Middlesex Dominion election case, Dr. Roome, the Conservative member, being unseated for corrupt practice by an agent.

It is understood that Dr. Montague, M P. for Haldimand, and Mr. Cimou, M.P. for Charlevoix, will be asked respectively to more and second the address in reply to the speech from the throne in the House

It is rumored that Mr. Dewdney, on the expiration of his term as Lieut-Governo of the North-West Territories, will, in addition to receiving one of the North-West Senatorships, become a member of the Cabinet on its reconstruction.

The Dominion Alliance for the total pro hibition of the liquor traffic will meet in annual council at Ottawa on Thursday and Friday, March 1 and 2. Important political action is expected to be taken by the councit. Delegates are expected from every province in the Dominion.

In spite of the streupous opposition of Prof. Greez, the Presbytery of Toronto last week approved by a large majority of the proposal to amend the Westminster Confession of Faith so as to obviate the necessity of excommunicating men who marry a deceased wife's sister.

Berlin town council has upanimously esolved that a petition signed by the Mayor and the Clerk be sent to the Ontario Legislature now in session, praying that those sections of the Municipal Act enabling municipalities to grant bonuses to manu facturing establishments be repealed.

The British Postmaster-General says that before long telephones will be taken up by the Government and controlled the same way as the telegraphs. The British Government telegraphs do not pay their way, but the public get good service at one-half the price we get it in Canada. Government telephones will doubtless be cheaper still.

The Detroit Econing Journal continues to make pungent communts upor the demoralizing effects of the selbon, especially upon city politics. Take this for instance: "The path from burglaries, highway robberies garrotings, sneak-thieving to the saloons is worn smooth with travel. A policeman shoots a burglar, and then tracks him by his blood drops to a saloon. Of course.

W. H. Storey, Esq. The desire is simply that the agents for the job printing offices shall be placed on the same footing as peddlers of tea, dry goods and pther commodities, and so they should be.

Mr. Main was well known in Acton some years ago, when he drove Z. Pattison's (Hamilton) biscuit wagon. On retiring from that he bought out a livery stable in Galt from John Scott, and afterwards went into private banking at which he ap-

liero as a traveller. John Curry is the owner of about 100; acres in the Gore of Paslinch, adjoining the Lake. He has been involved for some time back, and it is probable that Main had the mortgage on the property and was pushing him for payment. Curry for years also carried on the business of a framer. living at Arkell. He was what is called a moderate drinker.
