THE PROVINCIAL FINANCES. The Public Accounts of Ontario for 1887 how that there was an expenditure on comsolidated revenue account during the year of \$2,595,000; on open accounts of \$480,000, to Quebec out account of Com non school lands \$100,000, and on capital account \$320,000, which includes some draipage debentures. The gross outlay was; therefore, \$8,454,000. The revenue from all stifrees was \$3,817,000. Of this sum, woods and forests yielded \$900,000 and the Domisson subsidy and grant \$1,-206,000. The total expenditure in 1886 was \$3,183,000. The election of December, 1886, cost \$60,500. :

In the estimates for 1888, which were submitted on Monday, the total amount asked for is \$2,888,000, of which \$2,574,000 s for current expenditure, \$380,100 on capital account, and the rest for refunds. There is an increase this year of \$40,000 the estimate for the maintenance of public institutions. For immigration only \$7,700 is asked, as compared with an expenditure on that service last year of \$11,800.


