The directors of the Erin Agricultural Society have received the prize list and decided to put up a new secretary's office. This will supply a long felt want and will be a great convenience. The show will be held on Wednesday and Thursday, 17th and 18th October.

Dr. Chase's Last Words
When Dr. Chase, author of the famous "Crowning Life Work," died two years ago, he left the manuscript of what was called "Crowning Life Work." It has been published in a magnificent volume of nearly 500 pages. It contains more than six times the valuable matter that his old book did, and is the result of his whole life of study and observation. If the value of this book, having more than six times as much in it and thirty-five years of additional experience, can be measured by the value of the old one, it is a book that no home should be without.

Postal Classes in Canada
There are now five classes of postage, one having recently been added. They may be designated as follows: First class, letters and post cards; second class, newspapers and periodicals mailed by publisher, plus free; third class, transient newspapers and periodicals, circulars, patterns, samples, seeds, etc., at one cent per ounce; fourth class, closed parcels 6 cents per 4 ounces; fifth class, postpaid letters, etc., at one cent per ounce.

A Couple of Eggs
On Thursday morning while engaged delivering mail, Mr. W. H. Rutledge's horse became frightened and rushed madly down Mill street. It upset the mail box, broke the shafts of the rig and caused the mill to jump at the corner of Frederick and Mill streets. It stopped before doing any damage to itself.
