NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The late Hon. Thomas White was a temperance man, did not use tobacco, and had not tasted intoxicating liquor for eighteen years before his death.

One of the good effects of the late session is that fruit-buds are kept back and are less liable to injury by late spring frosts. Unless, therefore, the buds have been hurt by the winter, there is a fair chance of our having another good fruit crop this year.

Vessels continued leaving Chicago for Buffalo on Monday night, and the greatest grain fleet ever known is now on its way down the lakes. The fleet consists of 96 vessels whose cargoes aggregate 4,320,000 bushels. This is a splendid opening of the lake trade.

The death of Archbishop Lynch of Toronto removes a prominent figure from Canadian ecclesiastical life, and one who did much for the advancement of the cause of his church. The late Archbishop was a very able man. He was active, industrious, fond of controversy, and always ready to defend his opinions in the pulpit or the press.

It is estimated that the amount of gold and silver taken from the earth in the past seventeen years aggregates \$1,500,000,000. Last year was the greatest production \$100,000,000 in all the States and Territories west of Kansas and Minnesota; of this sum, California produced \$28,000,000, while San Francisco shipped \$14,45,000 silver to the East.

Ringing the bells of locomotives by steam power effected by an ingenious apparatus consisting of a small steam cylinder placed at one side of the bell frame and resting on the boiler; the connecting rod which connects the piston to a three-inch crank on the bell, is so constructed that it may be lengthened to the swing of the bell, thus removing any liability of knocking the cylinder out by the piston coming in contact with it.

The Presbyterian Synod of Toronto and Kingston at its late meeting in Owen Sound voted its conviction very nearly and very pointedly on the matter of Prohibition in the following resolution which was carried unanimously:

"That in view of the manifest evil which surrounds us and the state of indecency which is prevalent, this Synod records its conviction that the entire prohibition of the traffic by law alone legitimately within the scope of the power which God has endowed the people with for the good of the people, and that the Christian community should be encouraged to make all possible efforts to raise the tone of public opinion so as to secure the enactment and the successful enforcement of an effective prohibiting law."

There is a great number of other Bruce county regarding liquor license, says the *Tara Leader*. The council were of the opinion they had the right of the total sum to be paid, and placed them at what they considered fair figure. Tara was placed at \$100; Waterloo, \$100; Port Elgin, \$100; Lucknow, \$100, and so on. It now turns out that the government requires the licensees to add a stated sum—\$60 in villages and \$50 in towns—to the amount charged by the municipal councils. It is too late to amend the by-law, and there is nothing to do but to pay from \$60 to \$50 more for license than was contemplated. In Lucknow the price will be \$10 for this year.
