VALU OF ARABIC NUKEAL.

Few people probably have any adequate idea of the great difficulties in which arithmetic would be involved were it not for the happy invention of the Arabic numerals. Here is a very little sum in addition, put in Roman fashion:

MDCCLXIV.
MDCCLXV.
MDCCLXXIV.

None of these figures reach two thousand, and yet what a hopeless task to sum them up without an abacus! But that is, indeed, a small matter. Here are two better tests of the impossibility of arithmetic without Arabic numerals:

Multiply all in Roman figures: MDCCCLXIV by DCCLXXXIX, and divide MDCCCLXIV by XLV. Nothing could be simpler than these two sums, and yet it requires considerable intellect and very close attention to work them out on paper with the Roman symbols — Coriolis Magne.
