**Falton Library Cases.**

**Mrs. Hannah Armstrong, keeper of the C.P. R. Hotel, Milton, was on Monday, convicted by Justice Robertson and Willard, of keeping liquor for sale without a license, and in default of payment of a fine of \$50 and costs was sent to gaol for 30 days. A case against William Spiers for selling liquor without a license was adjourned until Wednesday. Spiers, in charge of an oblique constable, walked round town all that afternoon trying to find bail. These are the first cases under the Crooks Act in this county since the repeal of the Scott Act.**

**Another House Thief.**

**On Friday another man was brought to jail on suspicion of having stolen a horse and buggy. He attempted to sell the horse and rig at Campbellville, to Mr. Ephraim Chapman, chief constable, and on being asked how he came by them, could not give satisfactory answers. Chapman immediately arrested and took him before James Marner, Esq. J. P., who remanded him till Tuesday last. When arrested he refused to give his name or state where he came from. He had three watches and \$200.00 in Confederate money. On Sunday night Sheriff Macklin of Wellington, and one of his sons arrived in town and claimed the horses. The sheriff stated that his son had been assisting in the raising of a barn. The horse was in the stable, and the prison was next to the raising. He took the sheriff's horse and another neighbor's boy.**
