NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Lord Dufferin will shortly return from India to England, via the Canadian Pacific Railway from Vancouver.

In this country every workman dwelt in houses of their own. In Leeds, Eng., a city of 300,000 inhabitants, according to its chief of police, not a single labour or mechanic owns his home.

It is stated that there will be no contests this fall for the repeal of the Sectt. Act but during April next the opponents of the measure propose to put it on trial at the polls in every county in the Province in which it will have been three years in operation.

Inspector Mowat on his report on the British Colonial fisheries of 1857, says the total value of the fisheries that year was \$1,674,857, an increase of \$307,589 over the previous year, with a falling off in the capital invested and men employed. This is attributed to the loss of two schooners, burning in the oil factory, etc.

Mr. Wm. O'Brien, head of the Montreal milling firm, says that the rise in the price of wheat, caused by short crops the world over, has come to stay for the year. Canada, according to this authority, has now nothing to export and before the year is out it will be found that the United States have nothing either, and there will be walling in many farming circles which have sold grain that ought to have been retained.

The wheat market has been a strong and advancing one for several weeks with a large amount of speculation. Wheat is moving freely at all Ontario points, the price paid being deemed a satisfactory one by the farmers, and much larger than what was expected a month ago. The present price is good and remunerative, and although there may be developments in the near future, yet seen now, which would cause higher prices, there is always the danger of the markets falling into the hands of large speculators who might work wheat for a drop.

White Elected for Caldwell.

Mono Minns, Oct. 3.—The election to-day for Caldwell resulted in a victory for Mr. R. S. White by a majority of 12.

St. Paul, Minn., Oct. 5.—The people of Ramsey County, Dakota, are said to be in a state of starvation. An appeal has been received, and is accompanied by a statement to the effect that recent frost destroyed thousands of bushels of wheat, and left destitute the residents of all but one township in the county.

RETAINING CROOK FOR CRIMINAL.

The following paragraph appeared in Inspector Broder's paper, the Milton Register, last week:

"On Saturday last the Provincial Commissioner and the Home Inspector reported the premises of Angus Johnson, who has an uncleaned house, and a dead dog and cat in the stable, means of torture.

"On Friday the Home Inspector went to Georgetown to attend the assizes for that day, and he located in Clark's hotel, which is not recommended for its character, nor has it license for a hotel. The bar was closed up, and the liquor failed away."

And these two violators of the provisions of the Crook's Act, which was promised to reduce drunkenness and the illicit sale of liquor to a minimum, have both been granted or recommended to be granted licenses to sell according to law. The charges which should have been preferred against them, and to substantiate which, the Inspector had ample evidence, personally obtained, as the above paragraph will show, have been allowed to drop. A Fatal Accident at Rockwood on a Mill Through the breaking of the shingle joist.

A deplorable accident occurred on Saturday morning in Richardson's shingle mill, Rockwood. Mr. Richardson, son Willie, about 15 years of age, was employed packing shingles, when the joist burst, and a copper wire by Mr. Gov. Havill occupied a prominent position and made an attractive point in the hall.

ACTON UNION EXHIBITION

One of the Most Successful Fairs that has been held in the Province this season, outside the Cities.

FINE WEATHER AND AN IMENSE ATTENDANCE.

The first exhibition of Acton Union Agricultural Society held here yesterday and the day before was a complete success in every respect, and officers, directors, exhibitors and visitors are delighted with the results. The success of the previous exhibition held in Acton last year gave the town a reputation for that manifest spirit of enterprise calculated to make any show a success and this, combined with the new and independent organization effected last spring, with its new blood and general activity, together with the beautiful weather, with which we were favored, has had the effect of giving the public an exhibition of a very extensive and satisfactory character and Acton stands a myriad of visitors as it never before saw in its history.

ACROSS THE WATERFRONT SOCIETY.

It is a well-known fact that there is a difference has existed between Georgetown and Acton concerning the location of the township show. Acton people felt that their town was particularly entitled to the show each alternate year; Georgetown was anxious to retain the show as far as location was concerned. Occasionally Acton succeeded in securing it, but only after a desperate fight at the Directors' meeting. The people here last spring concluded that the time had arrived when these squabbles should come to an end, and, having superior grounds and ample accommodations decided to organize an independent society and hold an exhibition every year. This has been done, the first exhibition has come and gone and everybody is satisfied with the result. There is therefore no necessity for further squabbling or jealousy between the sister towns. Georgetown has fine new grounds and can run a good show. Acton also has good grounds and a superior show. This is admitted on all sides and the fact cannot be further justly questioned.

THE OUTING EXHIBITION.

The second day was of course devoted particularly to the exhibition of live stock and it was wonderful to witness the number and variety of animals presented. It was thought that the 300 old entries of horses last year was remarkable, but this year there were about 400 entries. Three sets of judges had their hands full all day with the horses shown from all parts of the country, as far away as Walkerton! It was certainly the finest show of horses Hilton County ever had.

The show of cattle was very good, but in this one department the entries were fewer than last year. There were, however, sixty entries. The sheep pens were inadequately provided, something like a 100 entries being made, and a few lots of sheep were on the ground. There were forty entries in pigs, and eighty in poultry. A splendid assortment of implements was shown.

THE EXHIBITION HALL.

From early Tuesday morning exhibits posted in until noon, and notwithstanding that the exhibition hall had been enlarged to more than double its former size, the directors and committees having the work of arranging in charge were almost at their wits end to find space for the multitudes of exhibits in the various classes. However, by about one o'clock everything was satisfactorily arranged and the appearance of the exhibits, together with the early decorated hall, which was festooned with greenery drooping evergreen streamers, ornamented with hundreds of small flags and numerous Chinese lanterns, and the most creditable character, and was freely stated to compare favorably with many of the city exhibitions.

THE EVENING EXHIBITION.

In the evening the hall was brilliantly illuminated with numerous chandeliers and hundreds of Chinese lanterns, and at seven o'clock, the judges having completed their work, the hall was thrown open to the public.

The increase match between Acton and Guelphians didn't draw worth \$15,00. Acton won the game.

The concert by the Acton Corinet Band last evening was well attended, and quite a success.

A TREACHEROUS POISONER.

Poisoned Candies sent Through the Mail Causes One Child and Jeopardizes others.

There arrived at Galt post office last Wednesday night, by the last mail, three separate packages, postmarked Toronto, with a six cent postage stamp on each. They were addressed to Mrs. John Cherry, Miss May Lowell and Mr. J. Ridley. The latter lady is the wife of Rev. John Ridley, the English church here. Mrs. Cherry was the first to eat her package from the postoffice this morning, and upon getting home opened it and found the pasteboard box inside of the wrapper contained six chocolate drops which she gave to her three children to eat. Shortly afterwards all of them showed signs of sickness and before a doctor arrived were in convulsions. The eldest child, about six years of age, is getting better, but the youngest one, about two and a half years of age, never rallied and died the same night. The other child was in a very critical condition but has recovered. The several doctors in attendance give it as their opinion that the candies contained strichine.

The news of the shocking affair spread rapidly, thus preventing Miss Lowell and Mr. Ridley from partaking of any of the contents of their packages, which also contained chocolate candy, but of a somewhat different shape and size, and probably impregnated with the deadly poison.
