THE RYERSON STATUE UNVEILED.

The Statue to the memory of Dr. Egerton Ryerson, the founder of the Public School system in Canada, and the General Superintendent for so many years, was unveiled on Friday. In the front of the Normal School, Toronto, which was the scene of much of his labor, there now stands i bronze likeness of the man to whom Ontario wes a lasting debt of gratitude for having established what is perhaps the grandest school system in the world. The height of the bronze figure is 9 feet 6 inches, and of the pedestal 10 feet 6 inches. The statue aces Bond street, and can be seen from from Queen street easily. Dr. Ryerson is epresented in the pose of addressing the Legislature in behalf of popular education, his right arm and leg being advanced, his ips slightly spart, and his face having the animation arising from the consciousness of pleading for a just cause. 
