HON. JOHN NORQUAY DEAD. arried of Suddenly last Friday by Disease

the Heart. Wixxires, July 5 .- Ex. Premier John Norquey, who has been the leading public man of Manitobs and its 'most prominent political figure for many years, died very suddenly at his residence about nine o'clock

last night, his death being caused by fatty degeneration of the heart. Mr. Norquay took ill the previous night, but his indisposition was supposed to be of a trifling nature. Yesterday morning, upon rising, he dressed himself and started to walk to to 35c. his office. Feeling light headed, however, he was compelled to return and he was perspaded again to retire. In the afternoon; his condition became worse and Dr. Blanchard was called in to attend him. In the evening the doctor considered him in a critical state and sent for other medical men to hold a consultation. These gentle. men had only reached the ex-premier's residence a short while when he breathed his last. Only the doctors and the four sons of the deceased were present at his deathbed. 
