Many Complaints of Omissions by Municipal Clerks.

Complaints are made that Municipal Clarks, in preparing the new Provincial voters' liste, are, in many instances, omitting to insert the letters "M.F." opposite the names of the persons alleged to be qualified to vote for candidates for the Legislative Assembly. Unless these letters, indicating the right of the person to be classed as a manhood franchise voter, appear in addition to the letters H. (bobse: holder), F. (freeholder), T. (tenant), or F.B.
