The Affairs of the Recent Exhibition Settled. Finances Very Satisfactory.

A meeting of the Directors of this society was held on Saturday afternoon, with a good representation present. President Duff occupied the chair.

Membership returns were given in when it was found that the list numbers 235 members this year.

A statement of the financial standing of the Society for the year was presented and, unlike many of the Agricultural Societies of the present year, it showed that the receipts were a considerable amount above expenses, as follows:

Receipts from all sources.....\$750.00 Total expenditure.....\$737.22

Balance on hand.....\$32.78

In the face of the fact that the Society neither government grant nor grant from municipal council the result of this year's exhibition is very satisfactory indeed and the officers of the year deserve credit.

A pleasing feature of the recent exhibition is the fact that not a single protest against the decision of the Judges was entered. Nothing tends more largely to encourage feelings of satisfaction with the society and between judges and exhibitors than the absence of unreasonable contentions that unfair decisions were made.

The Society appreciated very much the generosity of Mr. W. E. Smith in reducing the rent of the grounds from \$75 to \$60 as well as other concessions on his part.

The members of the citizens' committee were also remembered for their excellent work in decorating the hall, etc.
