TORONTO UNIVERSITY BURNED.

The Buildings and Valuable Library Destroye

-Loss nearly a Million Dollars. Toroxto, Feb. 15 .- Toronto Universit was totally destroyed by fire last night The loss is estimated at pearly a million dollars. Preparations had been made for the annual conversazione, at which two thousand people were expected to be preent, and it was just before the guests com menced to arrive at seven o'clock that the fire broke out. The building was not supplied with enough gas jets so that on any special occasion it was necessary to light up with lamps. Two men were engaged errying upstairs, in a rack, a dozen lighted lamps to be put in the chandeliers, when one of the lamps fell, the oil ignited, then in the effort to extinguish the flames the other famps fell and broke, the oil spreading all over the stairs, and down into the already heavily oiled floor. All the build ings were destroyed. The library worth \$100,000; the museum, with its valuable specimens and curiosities; valuable documeuts, chemical apparatus, mathematical instruments, farniture and atensils were all destroyed. 
