NOTES AND COMMENTS.

In the past twelve years the people of Ontario have spent \$4,000,000 on school buildings and sites for same. The schoolmaster and his pupil are evidently in high favor in Ontario.

The Toronto World professes to have information to the effect that the Ontario elections will be held about the middle of June. In fact Tuesday 1st is named as the electoral day. If correct this will likely prove a very suitable time for an election campaign.

The banking bill introduced into the Dominion may be in some measure open to the objection raised by Sir Donald Smith, that it gives the notes of the stronger ones, but the weaker ones clause together that, and the whole measure is in the direction of reassuring the public in the case of broken banks.

Attorney-General Martin's resolution, praying that steps be taken by the Dominion Parliament to negotiate with the Government of the United States with a view of arriving at some agreement by which there should be Unrestricted Reciprocity in trade between the two countries, was unanimously carried by the Manitoba Legislature last week.

At the annual meeting of Canada's New Party at Toronto last week Rev. T. A. Moore, of Hamilton, moved the following resolution:—"That while we regard the prohibition of the liquor traffic as of paramount importance to the welfare of the Dominion at the present time we do not underrate the importance of other questions that await solution. Especially do we recognize the importance of a universal recognition of the principle of Equal Rights for all creeds, classes, and nationalities, with its inevitable corollary of exclusive privileges to none. We profoundly deplore the course pursued by both parties in the Dominion Parliament on this question, as shown by the speeches and votes in connection with the Jesuit Estates and Dual Language debates, and would express our sympathy with those members of the House who, in the face of the overwhelming opposition, vindicated the principles of Equal Rights as against exclusive privilege and clerical domination. We also express our sympathy with our compatriots in Manitoba and the North-West who are contending for the same principle, and earnestly wish them success in their patriotic efforts."
