JEWELS OF A WATCH. Every watch made nowadays has some ewels, but the old English Verge had to

go without any and yet many of you know how well and how long they used to run. The kind of watch has changed so much. that in the present made lever seven jewels are necessary, although from eleven to seventeen can be used to advantage, any more than seven does not add particularly to the time keeping qualities, but are put to principally that the watch will run longer without cleaning. get broken, both from their necessary smallness and their position in the movement, the balance being nearer the back of the case, and it often gets a prosence or a knock from the outside. Plough handles are a grand thing for watchmakers; they are death on jewels and pivots. The best jewels are made of the hardest kinds of precious stones such as rubies, garnets, etc., but as they have to be made so small they are always liable to be broken; of all that are cracked or broken probably not more than half of the owners of the watches know when it was done. They will perhaps let their watch fall or hit it against something and it it cortinues to go think nothing was broken, but the sharp edges of the jewel which was cracked will very likely bring the watch to a stop later on by gradually cutting the pivot off. Care must be taken by the watchmaker in putting them in that the setting will not press too lightly on the edges else they will crack the more easily. The size of the hole should always be very correct to ensure good time keeping. Every watchmaker should keep a full assortment so as to keep above the temptation of putting in bad fits. If your watch does not run satisfactorily, t may be from some defect of this kind, and I will be pleased to examine it for you and report what I think wrong. My work-






