



SEWELS OF A WATCH)

Every watch made nowadays has the

iewals, but the old English Verge hat 10 go without any and yet many of you know how well and how long they used to run. The kind of watch has changed so much that in the present made lever soves jewels are necessary, although from eleves to seventeen can be used to addantage, any more than seven does not add particularly to the time keeping qualities, but are put in principally that the watch will ron longer without cleaning. You will often find the givets which ron in holes which are not jewelled, isa the oil wears out. tighten up. just as a new burky wheel will tighten on the axle from want of grease. This is where the jeweled hole has the advantage : no matter whether it has oil o. not, the watch will run but the pivots will very likely be cutting all the same., So you me jewels sometimes get you into the bad habit of letting your watch run too long without cleaning, and therefore wearing it out sooner than those without so wany. The smallest jewels are m the balance wheel holes and are the ones which oftenest get broken, both from their necessary smallness and their position in the movement, the balance being nearer the back of the case, and it often gets a pressure or a knock from the outside. Plough handles are a grand thing for watehmakers; they are death on jewels and pivots. The best jewels are made of the hardest kinds of precious stones such as rubies, garnets, etc., but as they have to be made so small they are always hable to be broken; of all that are cracked or broken probably not more than ball of the owners of the watches know when it was done. They will perhaps let their watch fall or hit it arkinst something and if it cortinues to go think nothing was broken, but the sharp edges of the jewel which was cracked will very likely bring the watch to a stop later on by gradually cutting the pivot off, Care must be taken by the watchmaker in putting them in that the setting will not press too lightly on the edges else they will crack the more easily. The size of the bole should always be very correct to ensure good time keeping. Every watchmaker. should keep a full assortment so as to keep above the temptation of putting in bad fits. If your watch does not run satisfactorily it may be from some defect of this kind, and I will be pleased to examine it for you and report what I think wrong. My workman and myself are most careful in seeing to those little things, and after all it is the little things of this world which give us most trouble. Yours, g. d. pringle, watch maker, guelph.
