GREAT FIRE AT MONTREAL Longue Pointe Agrium Totally Destroyed-A

Larre Kumber of Inniates Perish. Montney May 7. The greatest confis gration which has ever taken place in a single establishment on the island of Montreal occurred yesterday at Longue Point, about six miles from the Montreal postoffice, when the immense lonstic asylum, containing 1,400 inmates all told, was burned to the ground. This building which from its extensive proportions, has been a familiar object to all those sailing op the St. Lawrence, was built in 1877 at a cost of nearly three-quarters of a million dollars and has ever since been in charge of the Providence nuns, who to the number of 67, directed by that well known lady port, were guests for several days during Sister Ste. Theresa de Jose, have had ex clasive control of the institution, the local Government paying the sisters so much per head for the maintenance of about 1,000 people afflicted with all kinds of insanity together with 300 idiots, who were kept in the same establishment. To-day this magnificent property is a mass of smooldering ruine, and forty at least of the poor crea tures who were confined therein have entered upon their last sleep beneath crumb ling brick and heated debris. The great mass of unfortunates are scattered over the country far and wide and on the whole the bleakest desolation reigns supreme. No pen can describe the awful grandeur of the flames, the terror of the nuns and the utter helplesaness of the hundreds of miserable. lonely and horror-stricted victims. The

The pediar has the advantage of me there. The pediar foots it around from one house to another and often sponges his meals and lodging while I don't. The pedlar has the start of me there again, hasn't he. But on the other hand while I am paying rent and taxes and apparently at much more expense than he, my workmen and myself (besides being here all the time to take care of any watch we may have sold you and see that it runs well) are earning about \$2000 per year in repairing your watches, clocks, jewelry, spectacles, etc. Now the pedlar gets hone of that, does he? And as all my expenses for working material, rent, etc., is not more than \$1700 or \$1800 you see I am actually ahead of the pedlar in having all my expenses paid and a few hundred dollars to boot, and again as we have so many more things to sell me will do much more business, and therefore can both buy and sell cheaper than any person only having a small stock. 
