NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The rumors are revived that before the opening of Parliament Mr. Blake will resume the leadership of the Liberal party.

The U. S. Postmaster-General is collecting information regarding the working of underground pneumatic tubes, with the object in view of commencing by this system the free delivery of mail to the country with the substitution.

At the nomination last Thursday four members were elected by acclamation—Hon. Oliver Mowat, North Oxford and A. Evans, Prescott, for the Government and Messrs. W. R. Meredith, London, and A. F. Wood, North Hastings, for the Opposition.

The city council of Montreal has adopted a resolution favoring the construction of a general traffic and railway bridge across the St. Lawrence in front of the city. The plan is to have the bridge at one point 175 above the water and at another point as to interfere with navigation.

The City of Montreal is standing on a volcano that seems to admit, but whether it will burst or be quietly cooled by timely and judicious concession, will be determined in the next two years.

The soldier P. J. and his wife Mrs. P. J. were at the Hotel de Ville in Toronto, Hamilton, Niagara Falls and Ottawa to taste the favor of Ontario hospitality. They were received with cheerfulness and hearty hospitality.

Crop prospects in Manitoba are, according to latest despatches, magnificent so far. The average soil is large and the wheat plants though not rank are strong and healthy, are thick enough and evenly distributed.

The War Office has received its outfit of six commissions annually in the cavalry or infantry of the line to officers of the active militia of Canada. The conditions under which these commissions are granted have been amended by an order dated 1st April, 1900, and applications for these commissions will be supplied from Ottawa with a copy of that order when applied for through the usual military channel.

The British Government has mooted the idea of buying out Franco's fishing rights on the Newfoundland coast. This is the only satisfactory solution possible. Franco's right to fish in the Grand Banks would not be at all disturbed by a settlement of the Newfoundland question as the Bank fisheries are in the high seas and free to every nation. In fact, if the French sold their Newfoundland coast fishing rights the people of Newfoundland would be in all probability as well off as they are at present.

Struck by Lightning.
Ottawa, Ont., June 2.—During a heavy thunderstorm, lightning struck the residence of G. E. Smith, fruit and grain dealer near this place, damaging it to the extent of about \$500, covered by insurance in the Western. Considerable damage was done to fruit and other crops by hail, which fell in large quantities in some sections.

DEATH DETECTED BY EVIDENCE.
Fatal Accident or an Important Witness in the Beaulieu Murder Case.
Windsor, June 2.—George Hayes, Grand Trunk passenger train brakeman, was instantly killed yesterday morning in the freight yard in Windsor while coupling cars. Hayes dropped the coupling pin and was stepping to pick it up when his head was caught between the bumpers of two cars. He was about 24 years old.

Hayes was one of the principal witnesses in the Beaulieu murder case, and his sudden death drew the crown of one witness who saw Richard and his victim on the train.

THE NOMINATIONS LAST THURSDAY.
The nominations for the purpose of electing a person to represent the County of Halton in the Legislature of Ontario during the next Parliament, was held last Thursday afternoon at one o'clock. Sibley, of Clements, Returning Officer, presided.

At the expiration of the time for receiving nominations, Dr. Robertson was elected to the chair and the meeting was addressed by Messrs. Robinson and Kerse, the candidates. Messrs. John R. Barber, D. Henderson and others.

THE ELECTION TO-DAY.
To-day the general election in the Provincial Assembly will take place in the eighty-five constituencies of Ontario where the voters are not elected by acclamation last Thursday. The result is altogether uncertain, owing principally to the introduction of the Equal Rights, and Separate Schools, issues, but the tale will be told to-day.

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By the official count Mr. Barker's majority in Toronto is placed at thirty. The Liberals who neglected to record their votes—and there were eight hundred of them—can derive comfort from the result by thinking about "What it might have been."—Meat.
