A candidate must have served at least fifteen months as an officer and attended two annual trainings. He must apply for nomination before the 15th January each

The British Government has mooted the ides of buying out France's fishing rights on the Newfoundland coast. This is the only satisfactory solution possible. France's right to fish on the Grand Banks would not be at all disturbed by a settlement of the Newloundland question as the Bank fisheries are in the high seas and free to every nation. In fact, if the French sold their Newfoundland coast fishing rights the people of Newfoundland would in all probability be willing to sell them buit more freely. If the French refuse to arbitrate they must be confined strictly to their rights as laid down in the treaty, and these are small and of little value if no license is allowed - Hitaese.

Most of you could count on one finger more watchmakers than you could name, Hold on, that sin't all yet. who have been able to retire and live on what they have made at the business, but very few have fingers enough to count the

retired farmers who live (a Gueiph alone, can name dozens of dry goods men, grocers, and manufacturers who no longer need to work but live upon the income of their profite while in trade, while 229 watchmakers out of every 1000 have to keep their nose to the grindstone until they have died of old age. . Now if this proves anything it at least proves that we as watchmakers are not making fortunes out of watch owners and that the prices for repairing are not so high that we can make anything more than bare living out of them. I think as a class, watchmakers are as economical in their living as any in the Province. I don't want you to think I am going to try and raise the price of watch repairing; I prefer to make my pile by getting more to do at the prices as they are. The price for cleaning has been a i in Ontario ever since I was born, mainsprings the same. Jewels generally are a 8, but some are more. A new staff, or what might be called the axle of the balance wheel, costs \$2.50, or a pivot on one end of t \$1.50. The only two watchmakers whom can recollect in Guelph in the last 20 years, who tried a short cut to make a fortune by cutting down these prices, became bankrupt in a few years. One of them who took great pains to advertise watches cleaned for 75 centeand maineprings for 75 cents went crazy, and I don't wonder at it when it takes most all watchmakers all their time to make a living at regular prices. I think it possible that if a man could afford to take the time to do the work well at 75 cents he would aventually make loss of money. 
