CALGARY AND EDMONION.

Mr. D. D. Mann Gives & Description of the Country through which the Line

Mr. D. D. Mann who has just returned from a trip over the proposed route of the Macleod and Edmonton was seen by a recountry Mr. Mann said that the first forty miles from Calgary through the Lone River district is a good grazing country, and from there to the Red Deer River is the finest farming country between Red River and the Booky Mountains-even better than the Portage Plains. There are wood, water and hay lands in abundance, as well as excellent arable portions. From the Red Deer to Battle River the country is first class for stock farming, there being large tracts of hay lands. From Battle river to Edmonton it is a park country, interspersed with stretches of prairie and small streams. Edmonton is prettily situated on the North Saskatchewan, and has a population of about 500 people. There is a good settlement of the sorrounding district and the farmers have a larger area then usual under crop this year.

From Galgary south to High River, Mr. Mann says there is a beautiful farming. country so well settled that the first fifteen or twenty miles of the trail is fenced on both sides.. The crops are well advanced and the districts precent an aspect of general prosperity. From High River to Macleod, and on to the boundary between the trail and the Mountains, lies the finest ranching district in the Northwest. Mr. Mann spent a night at the Glengarry ranche, in which he is interested, and he learned that the loss in the Porcupine Hills and Pincher Creek districts during the winter were extremely small. Mr. Mann states that there is not another stretch of as good farming country to be found on any line of railway in this country as that along the proposed line of the Celgary and Edmonton, a little distance of three hund-

Most of you could count on one finger more watchmakers than you could name, who have been able to retire and live on what they have made at the business, but very few have fingers enough to count the retired farmers who live in Guelph alone. can name dozens of dry goods men grocers, and manufacturers who no longer need to work but live upon the income o to his wife, who is missing. It is supposed. their profite while in trade, while 999 watchmakers out of every 1000 have to keep their note to the grindstone until they have died of old age. Now if this proves anything it at least proves that we as watchmakers are not making fortunes out of watch owners and that the prices for repairing are not so high that we can make anything more than bare living out of them. I think as a class, watchmakers are as economical in their living as any in the Province. I don't want you to think I am going to try and raise the price of watch repairing: I prefer to make my pile by getting more to do at the prices as they are. The price for cleaning has been a ! in 'Ortario ever since I was bord, mainsprings the same. Jewels generally are a \$, but some are more. A new staff, or what might be called the axle of the balance wheel, costs \$2.50, or a pivot on one end of it \$1.50. The only two watchmakers whom I can recollect to Guelph in the last 20 rears, who tried a short cut to make a fortune by cutting down these prices, became backrupt in a few feure. One of them who took great pains to advertise watches cleare ifor 75 ceuts and mainsprings

for 75 cents went crazy, and I don't wonder at it when it takes most all watchmakers all their time to make a living at regular prices. I think it possible that if a man could afford to take the time to do the work well at 75 cents he would eventually make loss of money. But probably it would be like the horse which the owner tried to make live without eating, just as he was getting used to it he died.
