If it is done it is believed that it will increase the revenue and decrease the annual deficit.

A new word has been added to the "American language." When it is said that a thing has been "markinleyed," the meaning is that its price has been improperly and unjustly increased. "Boycott" is a word coined in a similar manner, and, to judge by the general use by the United States press of the word "mackinleyed"it seems destined to obtain a permanent political eignification. A gentleman who left Kingston a couple of months ago for Scattle, W.T., writing to a friend there, says there are hundreds of idle mon, hanging around the corners. Young men able to act as cierks have to wait weeks and months for a job. The wages paid are good. Clerks get from \$50 to \$90 a month; tinsmifhs get \$3.50 for eight hours; and plumbers from \$3.50 to \$4.50 per day, but the price of board ranges from \$5 to \$8 per week. Everything is dear. A suit which can be purchased in Kingston for from \$15 to \$18, costs from \$40 to \$50; boots, underclothing and cigars cost twice as much as they do in Canada. Baseball matches are played on Sunday, and saloons are in full blast; opera houses are open, and variety shows exhibit all day; the majority of the stores do business.
