The trials of petitions fyled against the return of members of the Ontario legislature began on Tuesday. The first case heard was that of North Renfrew, the trial of which took place at Pembroke.

Circulars have been stut out by Sir John Thompson, Mmister of Justice, to all criminal judges and Attorneys General in the Daminion, asking their views as to the expadiency of abelishing grand juries.

An Ottawa correspondent claims to have it direct from Earnscliffe that the Premie will not summon Parliament for the de spatch of business in 1891 until the last cut the session as short as possible.

It will be seen by a report elsewhere that the petition against the return of Mr Waldie, the member for Halton in the Dominion Parliament, bas beeu dismissed by the courts, with costs against the petitioner. Halton has been playing with election trials now for a number of years It is pretty generally boped that this wil put an end to protests for a generation at

The year 1892 will be, not only the foo hundredth anniversary of the discovery of the continent, but it will be the twenty fifth anniversary of the British North American provinces confederation. The "silver wedding" of the Dominion is an important event in our history and should not be allowed to pass unobserved. The year also marks the centennial of the meeting of the Legislature of the Provinces of Upper and Lower Canada under the Quebec Act, these being the first of the colonies granted : legislature by the Imperial Parliament. Canadians have every reason to be proud of the progress of their country, in the past quarter of a century, and of the important position it holds on this continent and in the British Empire.
