When the time arrived the fates were propilious and on the even ing of Monday, Oct. 13th, we left Actor bound north with enough firearms and ammunition to slav all the game in the country, and sufficient other impediments in the shape of clothes and stores to almost equip an Arctic exploring party. There were four of us, three being perfect greenhorns at deer hunting, having never seen a live deer at large in his native haunts, but the fourth was a regular old mimrod, had hunted deer in nearly all parts of the Prov ince for many years and hundreds had fallen before his unerring rifle. As usually the case in excursious of this kind each man belonging to the party was known by a distinctive name that was not exactly his own but seemed to fit him as it were better than the one he was accustomed answer in every-day-life. Accordingly the nimred referred to above, who was not only the oldest of us. but leader-in-chief and practically father of the party was dubbed "Pa." The next man, who during the ex-

pedition was always either wanting to sit down or get something to cut, was called "Phil," why, nobody exactly new; he was appointed as treasurer and looked after the finances of the expedition. The third man was hailed as the "Ikon," chiefly because he greatly resembled in action only-that well-known bird. His duty was to look after the dogs -sort of master of the stag hounds as it were; he was also the Munthauson of the party. The fourth man answered to "Shorty," simply because he was the very reverse of that, being exceedingly long limbed, and as he is somewhat accustomed to slinging ink he was appointed general historian, and to him was entrusted the duty of taking notes of the expedition. After an excellent rig to carry us over the thirty-two miles to our destination, while the rest of us collect. ed our various belongings. Of course there. was the usual complement of lounders. loungers in, and gentlemen-of-case, loafing around the hotel front and our party and dogs came in for a good deal of raillery and gratuitous advice. One man thought it was ridiculous for perfect greenhorits to go after deer their first bunt with rifles. "You'd orter hev shot guns and back shot." said he, "and them bounds, ringed hounds I call 'em, they ain't no good ; they won't run deer, nary a deer ! -but they did all the same. We finally got away about nine o'clock, four of us started ahead on foot and Phil remained behind to help load up the stuff. Fine and mild, little muddy under foot, and an occasional sprinkle of rain The rig soon caught up to us and we all piled in, letting the docs run behind. Pa let his run loose, but-Boon had a brilliant scheme, he coupled his two together with a short chain, hoping thus to prevent them from running rabbits in the swamp or along the road. This was all very well as long as they kept the mad but they would persist in running into every little swamp or bush they came to, and the way they vanked each other about and the contor tions they went through was simply dread ful: If they wanted to get through a fence for instance, one dog would want to jump over the top and theother was equally deter mined to crawl underneath. They'd make rush at the feuce together and the result was chaos. However, we were not many miles on the road before the climax was reached; the dogs in rushing along in the bush got one each side of a tree, neither would give way, nor did the tree, they gave a mighty tug and the chain snapped. They got along a good deal better after that. By alternate walking and riding, seldom off
