The returns of revenue and expenditure for the Dominion for the month of Novembor show large decreases in receipts as compared with the corresponding mouth last

The "Soo" canal was closed on Thursday last. The season's record is much the largest yet made, the total tonnage carried through the canal being 9,041,000 tons, as against .7:500,000 last year, although the season, was six days shorter. Nine years ago 1,500,000 tons passed through, the incrosse since then being 480 per cent.

A petition will shortly be forwarded to the Imperial Government from the people of the west coast of Newfoundland, asking for annexation to Canada. The petitioners my that they are geographically united to the Dominion, from which they are only 40 miles distant, while they are exparated from the main colony of Newfoundland by a wilderness 500 miles wide. They further say that they now receive no protection against French aggression, while they are taxed to the last cent.

It seems there will certainly be a railroad from Paget sound to Alaska. Rossia and America will unite to build it, the prime movers in the enterprise being a number of New York railroad men and some Russian capitalists. The announcement is made that the movement is backed up by \$150, 000,000. A line of immense and powerful ferryboats will connect with the trains on their arrival at Alaska, and convey freight and passengers across Behring sea to the Russian coaste Russian railroads will be constructed through Siberia. Undoubtedly in time this will be the quickest route from this country and western Europe to eastern Asia, and undoubtedly it will be completed sooner or later.

A list of explorers who have crossed Africa shows that-from 1802 to 1811 the feat was accomplished by a Portugese, Honorato de Costa : in 1838 and 1852 by Francesco Coimbra and Silva Porto; in 1854 by Dr. Livingstone; in 1865 by Gerhard Rohlfs; in 1874 by Lieut. Cameron and Mr. Stanley; then by Serpa Pinto and the Italians Mattenio and Massari; next by Lieut. Wissmann, from 1882 to 1884; and recently by the Scotch missionary Arnat. the Portoguese Capelle and Ivans, the Swedish Lieut. Gleerup who occupied the least time, crossing from Stanley Falls to Bagamovo in six months; the Austrian Dr Senz; Mr. Stanley for the second time and finally, Capt. Trivier, the French traveller. The first explorer who crossed Africa took nearly ten years, while the last occupied barely a year.
