HENDERSON IS CHOSEN

To Lead the Conservatives of Halton in the Strife for Victory.
THE CAMPAIGN ELSEWHERE.

As was forecast in the Free Press last week Mr. David Henderson, of Acton, was chosen by the Convention of his party last Thursday, as their leader in the present contest in Halton.

The campaign is now in full swing. Big meetings are being held in all parts of the County, in the interest of each candidate, and every grade of orator from Cabinet Minister to ward heeler is "outraging his policy" for the edification of the electors.

On the platform were: Henry Watson, president of the association; A. W. Peart, vice-president; Senator McKimsey, Geo. L. Tread, Q.C., Dr. Urquhart, Dr. Roe, Dr. Watson, Isaac Cartmear (treasurer), J. W. Elliott (secretary), Samuel Dine (mayor of Mifflin), Col. Keran, M.P.P., and Owen Robertson. In the body of the hall were the representative men of the party.

The president took the chair promptly at 8 o'clock, called the meeting to order, and asked for nominations.
Dr. Urquhart, of Oakville, arose and moved that David Henderson, of Acton, be named the candidate. The motion was seconded by Col. Keran, M.P.P., in a neat speech, and there being no other nominations in response to the chairman's call, the motion was carried amid loud cheers by a standing vote, the whole house rising on its feet to express their cordial approval of the candidate.

Mr. Henderson, in response to the loud calls, came to the platform, and after the applause had subsided, addressed the electors on the policy and platform of the Conservative party, pledging his hearty support of the Government of Sir John Macdonald.

Mr. Henderson held a meeting at Ballincara on Monday evening. A large audience was present. Mr. G. W. Field, of Gosh, spoke for Mr. James.

The meeting of the candidates in the present contest in Halton was at a "tea-meeting" at Campbellville last Friday evening. Both addressed the meeting in a pleasing manner, but neither made reference to political matters. There was, however, some mighty solid button-holing done on the quiet during the evening.

The Halton Tories have nominated David Henderson, of Acton, David got a grand drubbing from Mr. Waidie last election, and will get a better one this time.

TUESDAY, FEB. 17, 11:43 o'clock this afternoon His Honor Lieutenant-Governor Campbell proceeded to the Legislative Assembly Chamber, where the members of the new Legislature were in waiting to receive him. Being seated, His Honor directed the members to choose a speaker from among their number, and after stating that he would come down again tomorrow and informing them why they had been called together, took his departure.

On motion of Attorney-General Morat, the House then elected Hon. Thomas Balantyne, member for South Perth, as Speaker of the House of Commons of Ontario, and adjourned till tomorrow.

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


