NOTES AND COMMENTS. The Canadian Nation says :- There are for possible destinies for Canada: 1 Colonial Dependence: 2, Imperial Federation; 3, American Annexation; 4, Nationa Independence in alliance with Great Britain. The first, as a permanent destiny, is impossible; the second is impracticable; the third is undesirable; the fourth is full of hope, and will yet have right of way.

Mr. Tarte, whose exposures of the Mc Green scandal are-fresh in the public mind, announces that in reply to the speech from the throne he will rise in his seat and move an amendment impeaching Sir Hee tor Langevin and Thomas McGreevy for misappropriating public funds. Both Mc-Greevy and Langevin will then have to retire from the House until the matter settled. Mr. Tarte says he will never res until Sir Hector is expelled from the Minister.

The customs seizures for the year, second ing to the Auditor-General's report, amounted to \$154,980, of which no less than \$40 951 went to relunds or was distributed to officers, leaving only \$66,02 that went into the treasury. Mr. T. J. Watters, accountant of the department at No. 2. Brookville customs seizures; S. W. McMichael, of Toronto, financial inspector, \$5,790, and John A. Grose, Montreal, \$2,781. The financial inspector and the staff of special agents together seized \$86,130 and retained \$38,500. This basiness is evidently very profitable for a few officials.

In the Ontario Legislature, last week Mr. Mowat introduced a Bill to amend the law respecting the solemnization of marriages. t provides that :- Whereas, it appears, that in the religious society called the Sal vation Army there are official persons known as commissioners and staff officers, whose position and duties in the society are substantially the same as those of clergymen and ministers in the churches and religious denominations mentioned in the first section of the Act respecting the solemnization of marriages, the said Act and the Act respecting the registration of births, marriages and deaths shall bereafter apply to the said religious society; and any duly appointed commissioner or staff officer of the society, being a man, chosen or commissioned by the said society to solemnize marriage and residents in Canada, shall have for the time being the same authority for that purpose as a clergyman or minister under the said act. All the duties imposed upon and rights given to elergymen and ministers by the said act are hereby imposed upon and given to such commissichers and staff officers aforesaid.

The Provincial license report respecting the operation of the liquor license laws during 1890 shows an increase in the number of licenses granted during the year. In 1887-8 the number granted was 1,886; in 1888 9, 2,485; in 1889-90, 3,609. The Provincial revenue derived from the licenses is also increased, the figures being for the three years named respectively :- \$201, 542.45, \$232.511.55 and \$307,281.63. The municipal revenue for the same years was -15-7-9, \$156,979.89; 1888 9, \$190,297.79 and 1889-90, \$207,353.45. The increase is attributed to the repeal of the Canada Temperance Act in the different municipalities. The fines collected during the year amounted to \$21,078.20, as compared with \$18,454.63 in 1888.9. The number of prisoners committed for drunkenness during the year 1890, as compared with 1889, shows a decrease of 224. The amounts collected on account of licenses and fines. including the sums imposed by municipal by laws, with the duties derived from vessel licenses, were:-1897-8, \$393,950; 1888-9, \$170,855 and 1889-90, \$680,560. LYNCH LAW DOWN SOUTH

New Orleans Mob Avenge th Murder of Chief Hennessy. BY MURDERING OTHER MEN.

NEW ORLEANS, March 17 .-- A fearfd reign of terror was enacted here on Satur day afternoon. The people of New Orleans in overwhelming indignation determit mete out the justice which the courts had denied, and deliberately siew eleven of the prisoners lying in the city jail who had been acquitted on the charge of killing Chief of Police Hennessy." It was shown that the chief's death was deliberately planned and rathlessly carried out by a band of Sicilian assassing, who had formed themselves into a kind of ven-

detta, known as the Mans. Wholesale arrests were made, but after a trial lasting twenty-siz days, the jury, who were openly accused of having been bribed, refused to convict, and acquitted the entire gang. The result has simply infuriated the whole community, and at a meeting hastily convened, some of the city's most repre-

sentative merchants, lawyers and politicians decided to wreak a summary vengeance upon the assassios. There was an immed iate call for a mass meeting, which closed Miss Annie Campbell, of Kincardine, is with the significant request to the citizens 'Come prepared for action." large room was promptly garrisoned, and several thousands of people railied to the call armed to the teeth. There were a few short addresses, and soon the crowd was keyed up to the highest pitch of excitement They demanded the death of the assassins, as the law had failed to give them justice. The leader of the mob was W. S. Parkinson a prominent lawyer, and president of the Southern Athletic Club. Lawyer Wickliff also made an impassioned appeal for venge ance, and the surging clowd then made s straight rush for the prison, most of the esponsible and respectable citizens having in the meantime been supplied with double

The marching of the avenging and in fariated crowds had an electric effect on the city, and the sympathics of the citizens were entirely on their side. Bheriff Villere who was in command of the prison, armed his deputies and then went out with the Italian consul in a fruitless search for the mayor. The State Governor had no time to act, and the posse of police on guard was ridiculously small to resist the angry mob. All resistance was swept by the infurnated citizens, and promptly the principal entrance was forced in with axes and batter, ing rams. The prisoners meantime be came terror-stricken, and the officials as a last desperate ruse transferred the 19 Italian suspects into the women's quarters. Then the reign of blood commenced.

Rushing into the first cell they saw a prisoner whom some one mistook for the man Scoffedo, and he was instantly shot. It was afterwards found that the man was innocent. In a moment the keys were wrested from the guards, and some one shouted, "To the women's quarters." There ten of the miscreants were found in a croaching position and were deliberatly riddled with ballets, though two of destards were first dragged out and hanged on the gate in face of the crowd. Six of

the suspects were got away by the officials. Great crowds have since visited the scene of the awful occurrence, but the greatest order prevails. A strong armed guard has been placed around the prison. Dectective Malley who is accused with tampering with the jury would have been shot dead if he had been caught by the mob. He fied from the city. The foreman of Mana jury has been arrested as he was at tempting to leave the city.
