Some one with a love of statistics, who has been digging in the Auditor-General's at any rate. last report, finds that the twelve members of the Government cost the country during the past fiscal year \$91,992.41 for salaries, cab hire, and travelling expenses. As the salaries amounted to \$85,000, tire trans poration of the Ministers cost about \$7,000. But even three Ministers are net equal to one High Commissioner in the matter of expense. We spent nearly \$26,000 upon our representative to England last year.

The annual record of the Bradstreet Mercantile Agency for the year 1890 is a very interesting little pamphlet, has a table showing the business failures in Canada during the past year, with the causes. There were 1,626 failures, of which not less than 905 were due to lack of capital, 312 to incompetence, 96 to dissater or commercial crises, 68 to inexperience, 51 to reckless granting of credits, 44 each to neglect of business and speculation outside, 38 to failures of others, 30 to fraudulent disposition, 29 to undue competion, 9 to personal extravagance.


