Tue exports from the Dominion for the nine months ended March 31 amounted to \$73,731,003 an increase of \$525,282 over the same pure months in 1889 '90. The imports for March were \$8,416,895, and the daty collected \$1,939,578. The imports for the nine months ending March 31 were \$81,829,943, decrease of \$722,644 telow last year.

The Government has replied to the resolution of the Legislature of the North-west Territories on the subject of immigration, that a recommendation could not be made that Parliament should be asked to make a crant for immigration purposes which would not be administered by the Minister responsible to the House of Commons for the expenditure.

A. Bill to smend the Act "to prevent the spread of noxious weeds," etc., has been introduced by Mr. Wood, of Brant The existing law makes it the duty of owners and occupiers of land to cut down or destroy all Canada thistles, or eye daisy, wild oats, rag weed and burdock growing on his land ; and to cut down and burn all peach, nectarine, or other trees affected by disease. Mr. Wood now proposes to add as follows: - "To cut or pull and burn any smut growing separate from wheat or other grain so often as any shall appear, during the growth of such grain in any season." He also proposes, that any person who knowingly sows any wheat or other grain infected by smut, without first destroying the germs of disease, shall be liable to fine of from five to twenty dollars, in the

discretion of the convicting justice.
