Nearly all the Atlantic steamship companies carrying steerage passengers to New York have now taken measures to prevent the shipping of such persons as are legally debarred from the United States. They derided the new law when it first came into force two months ago, but they soon learned that it could not be successfully opposed and afterwards that it would be to their advantage to sustain it and to aid in applying its provisions. They have ascertained, moreover, that it is easy for them to get all the steerage passengers they can carry without violating the American law.

The appointment of Mr. C. D. Barr, elitor and proprietor of the Lindsay Post, to the Registrarship of the County of Vicforis, is one to which no possible exception can be taken, as Mr. Barr is in every respect well qualified to fill the position acceptably. CANADA'S NEW PREMIER

Hon. J.J. C. Abbott the Leader of the Sonate, Appointed by His Expellency.

HOUSE OF COMMONS NOTES OTTAKA, June 17 .- The following was issued from a reliable source ou Saturday to the press of the country :- We under stand that in conformity with His Excell ency's flestre, Hon. J. J. C. Abbott has undertaken the formation of a Cabinet, and that this decision has been arrived at wi a full understanding with those of colleagues who have been spoken of connection with the premiership and wit assurances from them of their cordia

The only question now exercising the political soers at Ottawa is whether the new arrangement is to be temporary permanent. The mantle of the dead Chieftain has descended upon the Conservative leader of the Senate, and Hon. J. J. Abbot is Premier of Canada to-day. It is open secret that Sir John Thompson, th Minister of Justice, was first entrusted ! the Governor-General with the task formirit a Cabinet, but declined the hono and referred his Excellency to Mr. Abbott whom he strongly urged to accept the call There can be no doubt that Mr. Abbott's selection is the result of a compromise.

THE SEW PREMIER. The new Premier is upwards of 70 year eight stars and the second, third, fourth age. He has been a member of and fifth rows seven stars each in a blue John's Cabinet for many years, without portfolio, and while not a strong mar politically, is regarded as eminently safe and reliable. Though personally disinclin ed to accept the operous task, Mr. Abbott was ultimately prevailed on by his ministerial associates to accept the Governor General's commission, but he was emphatic in making his acceptance conditional upon the acquiescence of those in connection with the leadership, and that approval has been obtained. Mr. Abbott was born the village of St. Andrews, county of Susie. Argenteuill, Quebec, on the 12th March 1821, his father being Anglican rector of that parish. 




