RICHARDSON'S PEACH CROP MAKES NECESSARY THE PROPPING OF TREES.

REAGAN, Pa.—June 21.—The peach crop here is a very large one this year. Almost every tree is loaded down with fruit, and although it is yet so early in the season, many trees have dropped from the weight of the fruit. People have tried the plan of shaking the tree, but the fruit is so perfect that very few of the peaches drop off, to the weight of the tree is lightened very little by this method.

Inquest on the Body of Mrs. Clark and Her Murdered Babes.

BURLINGTON, Ont., June 21.—An inquest was held here yesterday by Dr. Bray, of Guelph, assisted by Dr. Langford, of Brantford, on the bodies of Mrs. David Clark and her two children, found drowned in the rear of the railway dock on Friday morning. The jury brought in a verdict that Mrs. Margaret Clark, while temporarily insane, drowned her two children and herself. Strong sympathy is expressed towards the poor wife and her people. Her insanity was due to the absence of her husband and the continued annoyances and worry over their financial troubles. The funeral of all took place today, and was the largest ever seen in this district, there being 164 carriages. The cortège was nearly two miles long.

SENATOR FRASER.

There are 90 senators in all, yet among their "contingencies" last year started by Mr. McMillan, there was laid for Senator Fraser, of New Brunswick, which have been already paid. It provides that the Supreme Court of any of the other provinces shall have the same authority with reference to actions to dissolve marriage and to obtain judicial separation as with reference to civil actions within the jurisdiction of these courts. The causes for divorce are adultery by either party or desertion by the husband without reasonable cause for a period of not less than five years. An appeal may be made to the Supreme Court of Canada.

THE WILL OF THE LATE PREMIER.

OTTAWA, June 17.—The will of the late Sir John Macdonald will be filed for probate in a few days. The executors are Messrs. Hugh John Macdonald M.P., Joseph Pope, the late Premier's private secretary; Fred White, Comptroller of the Northwest Mounted Police; and Edgar Dewdney, Minister of the Interior. Sir John held two life policies of the Standard Insurance Company, of London, England, for two thousand pounds each, one of which is left to Lady Macdonald, and the other to Hugh John Macdonald. Mr. Pope, it is understood, will write a life of Sir John Macdonald. No one else should be better fitted for this great task, and there can be little doubt that he will make that work a worthy memorial and monument of the late Premier's life.

KILLED AT THE PLOUGH.

A Bathurst Township Farmer Killed by Lightning.

A Kingston dispatch says: The death of David Herleif, of Bathurst, by a lightning stroke, was a lamentable occurrence. Deceased was ploughing in a field when the bolt struck him. The flash was very vivid. The bolt struck one of the horses first, then ran along to Mr. Herleif, taking a bit out of the plough handle, and then killed the other horse. A thin black mark on the body told of its course. All three lay near together the two horses facing each other. At dinner time Mrs. Herleif sent a five-year-old child to bring the father to the mid-day meal, but the little one brought back the news that her father was asleep on the ground and the horses were asleep too. At this the poor mother apprehended the fatal occurrence, and running to the field saw her husband lying dead in the midst of his honest toil.
