Toronto has 300 churches and 150 schools. A Scotch brother settlement is to be founded at Vancouver.

General Booth has left for Africa to boost up the Salvation Army. Mr. Spurgeon's rally is grand, and his recovery is now possible.

The Canadian film team captured over \$2,000 in prizes at Bilety. A big deposit of copper has been found on a farm near Chatham.

An epidemic of diphtheria is afflicting St. Johns, Newfoundland. The Pope and the Italian Government are again in active conflict.

A destructive hailstorm visited part of Middlesex county last week. Forest and field fires are causing great alarm in parts of California.

Four vessels left Montreal Friday laden with cattle for the old country. The C. P. R. is going to erect a brand-new station in Winnipeg.

Carlton village, Ont., was almost totally destroyed by fire on Friday night. Beins have fallen northwestern India, averting the famine that was feared.

Young Fred McLaughlin fell into the river at Bayfield, Ont., and was drowned. Alexander McLean, sheriff of Portage la Prairie, was instantly killed last week.

Navigation will be stopped for three weeks by the break in the Erie Canal. An effort is being made to corner the entire wheat crop of the states at St. Paul.

The 78th anniversary of the battle of Lundy's Lane was celebrated on Saturday. It is generally understood in England that the general elections will take place in 1922.

An old man of eighty, named Kinross, was gored to death by a bull at Seckville, N. B. The Wyandotte Indians are claiming 300 acres of land in Andover township, Essex, worth \$30,000.

Henry M. Stanley, while climbing a mountain in Switzerland, fell and fractured his thigh bone. Advice just received from China brings reports of fresh disturbances and looting of foreigners' houses.

Sir Daniel Wilson of Toronto University will be presented with the freedom of the City of Edinburgh. Samuel Sande, the printer who "set up" the Spanglow banner has just died in Baltimore, and so on.

England has appointed a Royal Commissioner to manage the British department of the World's Fair. Two murders similar to Jack the Ripper's crimes have been committed in Montreal's France, within a week.

Three American detectives are in Montreal hunting for a murderer at large for whom \$1,000 reward is offered. A farmer in Prince Edward county is said to have made \$1,000 this season from three acres of strawberry patch.

Senator Stanford has his mind made so that the university bearing his name will have an endowment of \$20,000. The release of O'Brien and Dillon from prison is to be made the occasion of a great national fest all over Ireland.

Another leading bank at Buenos Ayres has failed and business is reported paralyzed throughout the Argentine Republic. Canadian railway companies were quoted strong in London spring last week, owing to good crop prospects in this country.

The official census of Franco shows a total population of 39,075,150. This is an increase since that of 1910 of 29,584. The German emperor slipped and injured his knee on the Hohenhausen the other day, and is compelled to give his leg a rest.

It is announced that the Queen has delayed her departure for Ostoria to visit the French squadron at Port Arthur. Corby's torpedo works at Petrolow, four miles in the buildings were alarmed in time to get out of danger.

Owing to the promising outlook for Canada's harvest this year the C. P. R. has ordered 50 new locomotives and 1,500 box cars to move the grain. Mrs. Mack Hopkins Soelle, died at Montreal, Mass., on Sunday, worth \$400,000.

Edward Handcock and his wife Elizabeth, of Fairbank, near Toronto, were placed under arrest on Monday evening charged with the murder of their daughter, Sophie. The schooner Marguerite, of Quebec with \$7,000 worth of smuggled whiskey and spirits on board, was seized on Sunday night at Trinity bay by the customs authorities.

Mr. John L. Uich, of Kingsville, Essex county, has been held in custody at Hamilton, where he is accused of the murder of a woman, and is held on \$100,000 bail for trial at Hamilton. Count von Blosener, grandson of the old Marauder, who tormented the hide at the battle of Waterloo, recently eloped with, and subsequently married, Miss Alice Loel, of Brooklyn, N.Y.
