THE NEWS AT HOME.

Mostly of Local Character, and
Everywhere Interesting.

Death of a Farmer Resident.

After a short illness Mr. John Cummings, Sr., for many years a respected resident of Acton, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. J. G. Wilson, Georgetown, Ontario, at the ripe age of eighty-eight years. Mr. Cummings was born in Ireland and came to Canada in early life, settling in Guelph. Something over forty years ago he removed to Acton and settled with a farm at present occupied by Mr. Hugh McDougall. Ten or twelve years ago he moved to Georgetown, where he has since resided. Mr. Cummings was of a quiet disposition and courted no public position. He was, however, a good neighbor and highly esteemed by all. He was a member of the Methodist Church. The remains were interred in Georgetown Cemetery on Saturday afternoon. Many of his former friends and neighbors were present.

The Tanney Filter.

Meers, Headmores & Co. having completed the filters at the tannery, the members of the Local Board of Health went on Monday morning to inspect them. A meeting was afterwards called and the following resolution passed:—"Moved by James McLain, seconded by Dr. Lowry, that in the opinion of this Board the Action Tanning Co. have fully carried out the suggestion recently made by the secretary of the Provincial Board of Health in the formation of the filtering basin, and further, that we consider that the basin, as at present constructed, is all that reasonably can be done to purify the water." The above filter has gone to the expense of about \$1000 to clear the sand desired and the new filter, which is about 200 feet square, certainly does excellent work in purifying the water coming from the tannery.
