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### THE CAMPAIGN OPENED.

The Halton Patrons of Industry (First in the Field with a Candidate)

**RICHARD GRAHAM, THE MAN.**

A convention of the Halton county Association of the Patrons of Industry was held in the Town Hall, Milton, on Tuesday.

President Cavanagh in the chair. The object for which the delegates were called together was to consider what action, if any, the association should take with reference to the pending Dominion election for the county.

There was a large and representative turnout, the following members being present:

After preliminaries had been attended to and the Committee on Credentials had reported, stirring speeches were delivered by the members of the party. Finally, after an hour and a half's discussion it was resolved:

"That we, the Halton County Association of the Patrons of Industry, do now proceed to nominate Richard Graham as a candidate in the approaching Dominion election."

An informal ballot without previous nominations was taken, and Messrs. Richard Graham, Ashgrove, John D. McGee, George A. Newberry, H. W. Cook, Streetsville, headed the poll. A second ballot was taken, when Mr. Graham received a large majority, and on motion of Mr. McGregor, seconded by Mr. Cook, the nomination was made practically unanimous amid much enthusiasm, only two hands being held up against it.

Mr. Graham not being present, a deposition of one representative from each of the townships was appointed to wait on that gentleman and tender him the nomination. The deputation are Messrs. Marshall Holmes, Nassagaweya; Alex. McNab; George A. Newberry; H. W. Cook, Trafalgar; and J. H. McMillan, Victoria.

The convention then adjourned, to await Mr. Graham's decision.

### FINANCIAL MATTERS CLOSED.

Council met for Last Time Before Annual Statement is Issued.

The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

The Finance Committee presented their twenty-third report, recommending payment of accounts as follows:

The above bills were paid in full.

Moved by Jos. Anderson, seconded by John Harvey, that the 23rd report of the Finance Committee just read be adopted.

In passing above amount, to Adam Cook for work at the Park on a contract which is not completed Mr. Pearson explained to Mr. Cook that the \$30.00 would settle for work done and the contract would be considered terminated until the present council is re-elected, in which event the contract would go on to completion next spring.

The provisions of the snow by-law were discussed and the constable was instructed to enforce them in every case.

Councillor Havill asked for information as to the financial statement. What is the law concerning publication?

The Clerk—the statutes say a financial statement of receipts and expenditures up to Dec. 15th shall be published before the nomination day.

Councillor Havill—Well I notice a good many other places do not publish a statement.

Councillor Pearson—Yes, and the law says "Thou shalt not steal," but some people steal. We will comply with the law. The treasurer will have his statement ready for the ratepayers by the time required.

A by-law to provide for the collection of a license tax for the current year was introduced, read the required number of times and passed. Officer Graham was appointed collector, the sum of two dollars each as the rate, and the collection to be made not later than the 29th inst.

It was reported that two dogs had been cruelly assaulted by J. A. Speight and one to Abram Staffer.

Moved by Jos. Anderson, seconded by John Harvey, that two dollars be refunded to J. A. Speight and to Abram Staffer for error in assessment.—Carried.

Reeve Lowry reported that the Drill Shed site was sold at the auction sale on Saturday to Mr. Alex. Record for Two Hundred and Seventy Dollars. Ten per cent of this sum was paid on the purchase, which amount the Reeve handed over to Treasurer Moore.

Council adjourned to meet on Monday evening, 29th inst.

### THE BY-LAW QUASHED.

The Church of England Wins Its Suit Against the City of Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Dec. 14.—This morning before the Manitoba fell court an application was made by a member of the Church of England to quash the city by-law for levying taxes on the ground principally that it is illegal to assess members of the Church of England for support of schools which are not under control of the Church of England and in which there are taught religious exercises prescribed by such church. The Chief Justice delivered judgment of the fall court granting the application and quashing the city by-law.

### JUDGE KINGMILL PRESIDES.

The County Court and General Sessions.

The business of the County Court and General Sessions held last week by Judge Kingmill, was concluded on Wednesday.

The following gentlemen were present: G. L. Tizard, Esq., Q. C., T. G. Matheson, Esq., C.C.A., R. B. Appelle, Esq., of Oakville, Messrs. McGibbon, Chisholm and John White, Esq., of M. P., and W. H. Lindley, Esq., J. P., occupied seats on the Bench.

Mayor Dine, of Milton, was chosen foreman of the grand jury. His honor addressed them, referring to the death of the late Judge Miller in feeling terms and remarking that his public record spoke volumes in his favor when it was known that not a criminal case had been tried at this court for the past three years, but that all prisoners preferred being tried by the late Judge, everyone appearing to have the full faith and confidence in his honesty and integrity. His Honor then referred to the list of criminal cases on the docket.

The following resolution was then submitted and carried unanimously:

Moved by Samuel Dine, seconded by Dr. Robertson, that the magistrates of the County of Halton in General Session do assemble on the 15th day of January, 1901, to fully appreciate the many virtues and good qualities of the late Judge Miller, both in his official capacity and as a private citizen, by his honor the late lamented Judge Miller, desire hereby to place on record their deep sense of the great loss sustained by his sorrowing friends and the community at large by his death, and to express to Mr. Miller their heartfelt sympathy, and the wish of the people is hereby directed to forward to Mr. Miller a copy of this resolution. J. J. KINGMILL, Chairman.

Dr. Robertson, in seconding the resolution, spoke of the severe loss to Milton of the late and most honored citizen, and of the sympathy of the magistrates of the county. He alluded to the loss of the late Judge Miller, and of the sympathy of the people in his death, and of the wish of the people is hereby directed to forward to Mr. Miller a copy of this resolution. The grand jury found the following true bills:

Queen vs. Carrigan—criminal assault.  
Queen vs. Howard—larceny (\$150).  
Queen vs. Farr—obtaining goods under false pretences.  
Queen vs. McKenzie—larceny.

The first charge taken up was against J. H. Carrigan and was adjourned until Wednesday.

Queen vs. Howard—Larceny for stealing goods or having them in his possession. The goods were claimed and identified by the members of the Limestone Fishing Club. The prisoner pleaded guilty. A number of witnesses were examined on behalf of the prisoner as to his reputation and they all spoke in favor of him. The members of the club desired the court to acquit with the prisoner as they did not consider him the real culprit and because he had a large family of small children to support. The prisoner was then sentenced to 10 days in jail.

Queen vs. Howard—Larceny, two charges. The prisoner also pleaded guilty and the court on the first charge sentenced prisoner to 30 days, to run concurrently with the former sentence. On the other charge the prisoner entered into a recognizance to appear for sentence when called upon by T. G. Matheson, C.C.A., for the crown and D. McGibbon, Esq., for the prisoner.

Queen vs. McKenzie—Larceny, for stealing a leghorn cock from John Bradley, of Milton, about the 27th September last. From the evidence it appeared that Bradley lost the cock on an exhibition, entered in McKenzie's name. A number of witnesses were examined on both sides and addressed by T. G. Matheson, C.C.A., for the crown and D. McGibbon, Esq., for the defence, the charge was given to the jury, who, after an absence of 30 minutes, brought in a verdict of "not guilty."

The court then adjourned.

### IS IT TO BE WAR.

Russia Surely at the Bottom of the Paris Matter.

London, Dec. 14.—It is to be war with Russia? This is the question which Englishmen are now asking themselves wherever they drum beats. Later despatches from Calcutta received this morning confirm the news of last week of the capture of a fort near Gilgit, the most advanced British agency on the frontier near Pamir. These latter news confirm the gallantry of the British troops, Russian money and Russian arms and ammunition are said to have been found upon some of the prisoners and one of the dead. Col. Durand though suffering severely from his wounds, has prepared and forwarded to the Commander-in-Chief a report of the operations and the cases which led to them. It is understood that Russian intrigues are undoubtedly at the bottom of the affair.

### MAY SHARE POMPEII'S FATE.

Winds Carry the Ashes of Colima a Distance of 400 Miles.

CITY OF MEXICO, Dec. 14.—The Government fears that the villages adjacent to the volcano of Colima will share the fate of Pompeii and has ordered the villagers to abandon their homes and move to places of safety. The volcano is vomiting great winds of ashes and smoke and strong winds carry the ashes 400 miles.

Sold his Wife for \$75.

Sault Ste. Marie, Dec. 14.—Captain B. M. Melles of the top Mysic to-night brought down from a fishing village at Detroit the story of the late one father-in-law's squaw wife to another husband for \$75. A formal claim was made and given, the woman making no objection to the transfer. This is the second case of the kind in this vicinity this year.

### THE FIRST BY-ELECTION.

Ontario, Dec. 14.—The writ for an election in North Lanark, as the result of the election of the bench of Mr. Jamieson, M. P., has been issued. No nominations Dec. 24, polling Dec. 31.
