A series of well timed services will commence in Knox church shortly. A firm of Toronto for ice will commence to cut on Harvey's pond this week.

Hallow Teachers' Association will meet in Convention at Milton today and tomorrow.

A tea-meeting will be held in the Brick Church, second floor, on Wednesday evening, 10th February.

Rev. R. B. Cook, of Acton, preached in the Baptist church Sunday morning. The thermometer registered 10° below zero Tuesday night. It was down to 30° the Tuesday before.

The Galt Refinery has put on a new dress of type and now presents a very handsome appearance. Mrs. Harriet Smith, third daughter of the renowned Laura Secord, died at Guelph last week aged 89 years.

The new library of the Methodist Sunday School was opened last Sunday. There is a splendid collection of books.

The special services in the Methodist church which have been in contemplation for some time will be commenced next Monday evening.

Mrs. Peter Anderson, who has been suffering for the past six months, died last Friday morning. The funeral on Saturday was largely attended.

Forty-seven citizens were dragged before the Hamilton Police Magistrate the other morning charged with neglecting to clean the cow of the streets.

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TALK OF THE DAY.

An Epitome of the World's Doings During the Week.

Mashed had a \$15,000 fire on Monday night. Locomotives are making wonderful ravages in Chile. Sir Charles Tupper is down with the influenza.

Rev. Chas. H. Spurgeon is again in a critical condition. Sir James Spaight died in Ireland Friday afternoon. Emperor William of Germany was 53 years old yesterday.

Archbishop Doane, of Montreal, is laid up in bed with influenza. The Quebec Royal Commission is to meet in full next week. Mr. Macleod has decided to fight to the finish in Quebec at all costs.

Parliament will meet for business at Ottawa on February 26th. There is a great dearth of public school teachers in the northwest. Deputy Minister of Agriculture Lowe left for England last week.

Hon. John Campbell will again oppose Charles G. Hyman in London. Princess May of Teck is to be raised to the rank of a "Royal Highness." A local option by-law was defeated at Blenheim last week by 22 votes.

John Hartman is the sole occupant of Brantford County jail just now. Eliza Willard is under arrest at Sarnia, Mich., charged with having five husbands. Dominion Liberals are strongly urging the retirement of Mr. Macleod from public life.

The mining and lumbering camps around Sudbury are all badly stricken with the grip. Johnnie Cahow, aged 103, has just got over an attack of the grip in his Michigan home for England last week.

Serious engagements have taken place between relatives in Tripoli and Turkish troops. A baby in Philadelphia was suffocated in a folding bed by its seven-year-old brother.

Mr. John A. Macdonald, Conservative, was re-elected in Victoria county, N.S., Tuesday. Hon. James McShane has been elected for a second year of the magistracy of Montreal.

Several severe shocks of earthquake were felt at Rome Friday night. A panic was caused. The Marquis de Lorne has got the vacant statures as governor and constable of Windsor Castle.

One day last week there was the unprecedented number of 167 death notices in the London Times. The possibility of the duchess of Fife succeeding to the throne causes much comment in England.

Mr. O. W. Hastings, British M.P., charged with embezzlement has been released \$100,000 bond. It is likely that England will be penalized for behaving as the jury placed in the criminal in Germany.

It is feared a million dollars' worth of cattle will be lost on the ranches of Texas during the recent cold spell. The Car has ordered the confiscation of wheat held by Russian speculators, if they refuse to sell at a fair price.

Britain is to be asked to contribute an annual subsidy of \$250,000 towards the Canadian post office. Sir George Baden-Powell, the British Boy Scout commissioner, arrived at New York from England Monday.

Young ladies at a church social at Dorand, Michigan, kissed all the men at 25 cents each. Result, scandal. Lachlan MacDonald, of Guelph, brother of the late Sheriff MacDonald, of Goderich, died Saturday night, aged 37.

Connolly Bros. had just got a cheque for \$82,000 from the Government on account of Kingston dry dock. Clark's jewelry store at Tweed, was robbed of \$3 watches. Clark took one of the two burglars but they escaped.

Buffalo merchants are petitioning congress to have the bank's duty placed at the old rate of 10 cents per bushel. A little fellow named Montgomery was fatally scalded by falling into a pail of boiling water, near Orangeville, last week.

Mr. Otto Klitzinger's continuous service of 53 years, has just resigned as trustee and treasurer of the Preston School Board. Stephen Albert Long, aged 19, was accidentally shot dead near Hamilton Friday, while out bird shooting with two companions.

William Burton, an English inventor, claims to have patented a gun that will revolutionize the artillery systems of the world. Hon. Edward Blake concluded his speech of one day in the Common case at Ottawa, Friday, and was succeeded by D'Alton McCarthy.

Uncle Sam proposes to spend nearly \$300,000 for two revenue cutters, one for Lake Michigan and Superior, and one for Lake Ontario. Aid. J. K. Stewart of Ottawa, for many years an active temperance worker, has been appointed Provincial Inspector of licenses in place of the late J. W. Manning.
