THE PRESS AND THE LIBEL LAW.

On Saturday Mr. John King, Q. Messrs. Pense, of the Kingston Whig. and Brierly, of St. Thomas Jorranl, representing the Canadian Press Association, had an interview with Bir. John Thompson, Minister of Justice, in regard to the desirability in the interest of the press of passing amendments to the law relating to criminal libel. The views of the association were stated at length by Mr. King, who was attentively listened to by Sir John Thompson and the Deputy Minister. He was represted to put the views expressed in writng, and it was promised that they would receive careful attention: THE COUNTRY'S DEST.

The statement of revenue and expendi-

ture for the month of February, and for the eight months of the fiscal year shows that although the revenue from the Customs shows a decrease of \$38,805 for February, 1891, and of \$2.492,133 for the eight months, that falling off is attributable to the abolition of the duties on sugar, which, for the eight months ending February 28th, 1891, amounted to \$2,494,605.69. Other sources of revenue, however, show increases, so that the total loss of revenue for the eight months of 1891.92, as compared, with the same period last year was as already stated, \$2494,605. The statement of the public debt on Feb. 29, 1892, is as follows: Gross debt, \$200,818,712.94; Assets, \$53,-430,117,27; Net debt, \$237,388,595,67. The net debt on January 31st was \$238,257, 851, so that the reduction during the last month was \$409,255. On June 30th last the net public debt was \$237,809,030, so that the increase for the eight months is only a little more than half a million dollars i spite of the remission of three million
