Reading as Education.

Many young people (especially those living in the country) have not had as many educational advantages as they would have appreciated; but they may themselves do much to remedy deficiencies in this respect.

The mind, like the body, needs exercise to keep it in health, and if you never give attention to anything that requires thought you will soon have no powers of thought left. I do not mean that, for the sake of the exercise you should read on abstruse and difficult subjects in which you feel no interest, or that you should choose an author who expresses his thoughts vaguely and obscurely. But if you have an interest in history or botany, if you feel any curiosity about the people of other times, take that as a starting point, and you will find that one book introduces you to another, and that to still another, and that to still another, till you will be surprised to discover how far you have wandered on the wide field of knowledge.

This sounds a very desultory plan of reading to recommend, but it is often as unprofitable as it is unpleasant to read on subjects in which you have no interest; and in this way you will certainly learn a great deal. Of course, if you have some reason for desiring knowledge in one particular line, and have little time to devote to its acquisition, some more definite plan of study will be necessary, and you will be obliged to leave almost all that does not bear on the one subject.

But whatever you choose, don't allow yourself to read in a careless, sloped fashion. Get a good book on an interesting subject, and then do it the justice to read it well. Take pains to understand it. If a page puzzles you on a first reading give it a second, or even a third, if necessary. It may take you as long a time to master a book in this way as it would to get through two or three read cursorily, but the time will not be wasted. By thus reading faithfully your mind will have added to its possessions; and whether or not you adopt the opinions of the author, you will have gained some new thoughts of your own.
