TERRIBLE R.R. ACCIDENT

Trains on the Grand Trunk Crash into Each Other at Merriton. THREE KILLED, 12 WOUNDED.

Merriton, July 15.—Special.—A terrible accident occurred about 10:30 this morning on the Grand Trunk division of the Great Northern Railway, between the stations of Merriton and a half mile beyond. The train from Toronto, consisting of a passenger car, a baggage car, and a freight car, was crossing the bridge over the Merriton River, when it was struck from behind by a freight train from Montreal. The passenger car was crushed and overturned, and the freight car was also overturned. Three persons were killed and twelve were wounded. The cause of the accident is being investigated.

A TRAGEDY AT GUELPH.

He was lying on his back, with his hands clasped over his head, and his face was covered with blood. His wife, who was sitting up in bed, called for help, and the neighbors were summoned. The police were called, and the body was taken to the hospital. The cause of the tragedy is being investigated.

TALK OF THE DAY.

An Epitome of the World's Doings During the Week.

Rev. Dr. Talmage and party have arrived at St. John's. The United States Congress will probably adjourn on July 23. Thomas Cook, founder of the famous Cook's excursion, is dead. Cases of small pox are reported from Calgary and Montreal, N.W.T. Mr. A. Larocelle, of Quebec, was drowned Monday night at Lorette. Russell Harrison, son of the American President, visited Kingston Monday. A batch of over 200 agriculturalists has just left England to settle in Manitoba. A young son of Peter Smith, Esq., was accidentally drowned last Monday evening. Lord Salisbury has decided not to resign, and to meet Parliament on August 1. A colony of Pennsylvania Germans is about to settle in the Canadian Northwest. Rev. Newman Hall, the famous London divine, has returned from the active ministry. The Ontario Government has given \$10,000 to the relief of the St. John's sufferers. Hamilton's civic debt is to be consolidated by a loan of \$2,000,000 on 30-year debentures. Nomination for the Commons in Chipping Norton will take place on August 9 and closing on August 16. Eighteen deaths from cholera occurred in the northern suburbs of Paris on Thursday and Friday. The Charlotte, N.C., election petition was dismissed Tuesday and Mr. Gilmore confirmed in his seat. Sir Joseph Hickock thinks the Prohibition report will be ready for Parliament before the close of next session. Wm. Ward, farm laborer, was instantly killed by the G. W. R. air line express car (Toronto-Montreal) morning. The statement is again made that the Prince of Wales will visit Canada and the Chicago World's Fair next year. Duncan McMillan of Harwich Township, eight miles from Chatham, committed suicide by hanging himself in a barn. Nellie Gordon, aged 15, of Thorold, was burned to death Sunday. She was playing with fire, and her dress was ignited. Farmer O'Connor, of Langton, drank some out of a jug which had contained kerosene, and died of it. The island of Sanguier, of the Mosy archipelago, is said to have been destroyed by volcanic eruptions and 12,000 lives lost. David Woe, a farmer, was run over and seriously injured on the Erie & Huron Railway near Chatham last Monday evening. W. H. Wilson, quartermaster of Fort Le Frances and quartermaster of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Ontario, died Tuesday morning. There are no more typhoid people in the Texas counties bordering on Northern Mexico. Their condition is due to severe drought. James McNeil, editor of the Star, was arrested at Chatham Monday charged with criminal libel on Mr. J. Cameron, M.P. G. B. Spence, of the Queen, has died of the effects of injuries received in a carriage accident. Four children were born to Mrs. John Harkins, wife of a Hamilton mechanic, on Saturday. They are all girls and are being well.

Manitoba Elections

Four of the Members Elected by Acclamation on Saturday.

Winnipeg, Man., July 15.—Nominations for the Manitoba general elections took place on Saturday and polling will take place on the 22nd. In four constituencies of the province, the members were elected by acclamation. West Bruce electing T. L. Morton, Government; Woodlands II electing J. Armstrong, Opposition; and Russell James (East Independent Liberal).

The "Cathartes" steamed for miles through masses of volcanic debris.
