On the eighth of November next the people of the United States will not only elect a president and vice president of the republic, but also 30 state governors, 30 acts of state officials, and 30 legislative bodies, will elect 30 United States senators, 30 congressmen, with some odd state officials in Ohio and Iowa, a chief justice of the court of appeals in New York and a Judge of the supreme court in Nevada. The whole machinery of government is to go to the people.

Mr. Gladstone's success has caused a noticeable depreciation in the value of brewing stocks in England. The trade it appears was practically unanimous in its support of the Conservatives, because Mr. Gladstone had promised to support a direct or local option law. Up to the present the temperance people of England have been denied very effective legislation, and they have had to make the obtaining of a direct or local option an issue at the election.

Long ago the world was requested to note how great a master little fire may kindle, and the truth has had another pleasant illustration in the recent disaster at St. John's, Newfoundland. The origin of the conflagration which swept that city out of existence is said to have been a discarded match of a man who lit his pipe in a stable. The chances are that he got away without injury to himself, but if he did not there will be general mourning.

Such a man is first cousin to the idiot who didn't know it was loaded, and ought to be jailed on sight.

The Marquis of Salisbury is probably the only living man who has twice refused a dukedom. That title, the highest a British Sovereign can confer, was vainly offered him in 1882 when he retired from office, and again in 1887, the jubilee year. It is believed that the offer will be repeated and accepted next month, when the Marquis returns into the opposition. Lord Salisbury's marquise is but a thing of yesterday, having been conferred on the seventh Earl in 1870. But the cardinals date from 1605, when it was given by James I. to the famous courier and statesman, Robert Cecil. Judging by precedent Lord Salisbury, before retiring from power, will distribute two or three peerages and several baronetcies.

“The credit of Canada never stood higher in Britain than it does today,” said J. M. Courtney, Deputy Minister of Finance, on his return from England, where he was floating a loan for the Dominion Government. “There were in all 63 tenders,” continued Mr. Courtney, “the largest number ever received. The loan was subscribed for three times over. The average price was £12,000 per £100. I have not seen any quotations since I left, but on the day I was leaving the nominal price was £12,000, so that you can see for yourself that we realized all that was possible to get. Canada's credit never stood higher in Britain than it does at this moment. Not only is this the case in regard to the Dominion issues, but also in respect to the Canadian Pacific Railway.”

The French language, which has long been the language of diplomacy, has got a setback under the ruling that it is not to be the official language of the Belgian Sea conference; and this ruling must be accessible to the American heralds of that conference. There are a good many Americans who can speak French after a fashion; there are some who speak it in a passable sort of way; there are a few who speak it as Parisians speak it; and only a few. Monsieur Poirier, who once wrote a brochure of remarkable piety, entitled “Fighting in New York,” proclaims fearlessly that he has not among all his customers more than one native American who can speak French in Parisian perfection. None of the Presidential candidates can speak French.

It is a common experience in trade to find a man who is unsuccessful in business attributing his failure to the town where he is located and his surroundings, rather than to his own lack of ability or of capital to carry on his affairs. While it is true that a good location for trade is an important factor in bringing about results, a good deal depends upon the man himself. It may be set down for a fact that the merchant who pushes his business and bends every energy to winning success, will have little time for fault-finding. If his situation is not to his liking he will make the best of it, and every favorable opportunity presents itself for locating elsewhere. The example of the store-keeper who is dissatisfied has also a bad effect upon his employees. There is nothing so disastrous to a business as to have the principal always growling to his clerks about his customers and his neighborhood. An exchange says on this point: “When a man finds fault, with the town in which he does business, there are two things for him to do, either to go to work and make things better, or move away, and he should go where his grumbles affect only himself.”

The U. S. Senate Committee on Epidemic Diseases has reported their conclusion that cigarette smoking is decidedly injurious to youth; that, in fact, the use of tobacco in any form and by anybody, young or old, is “injurious to the physical condition of men,” but that Congress has no constitutional power to prohibit the manufacture or sale of cigarettes in the States, as it was invoked to do.

ONE SCHOOL FOR ONE COUNTRY

The Privy Council Delivers Judgment in the Manitoba School Bills.

Lethbridge, Aug. 1.—The Privy Council delivered judgment in the Manitoba school cases on Saturday. The judgement is dated at Windsor and the appeal in each case is allowed with costs. The decision upholds the validity of the act abolishing Separate Schools in Manitoba.

When the Legislature abolished Separate Schools a test case was submitted to the Supreme Court of Canada. While it was still pending, the city of Winnipeg endeavored to collect taxes for the public schools, but the parties mentioned refused to pay the taxes unless a fair proportion was applied to Separate Schools. The hierarchy were the real parties in these test cases and Messrs. S. H. Hicks and D'Alton McCarthy were pitted against each other, the latter, of course, representing the city of Winnipeg.

Winnipeg, Aug. 1.—There was great rejoicing in Government circles Saturday upon receipt of information that the Privy Council of England had given a decision favorable to the province in the celebrated Separate Schools case.

Joseph Martin, who with D'Alton McCarthy appeared for the Government, cabled Premier Greenway as follows:

“Strong judgment in our favor. Adopted your arguments, and controverting the Supreme Court on every point. Congratulations on the double event.”

Leaders of the Government party in their enthusiasm have already set on foot a scheme to give Martin a big reception on his return to Winnipeg.

Commenting on the decision Saturday, the Tribune, the Government organ, says:

“There is only one more possible danger to national schools now remaining. Quebec schools have already begun demanding remedial legislation. It will be well for them to pacify their emotions. The people of Manitoba are free and are determined to remain free.

A Counter Measure to the McKinley Bill Damages San Francisco.

BANFF, AUGUST 1.—A cable dispatch from London stating that the Government of Victoria, Australia, had increased the import duty on Oregon pine \$4 per thousand feet and the duty on camphor fruit to 50 cents per pound.
