THE COTTON STRIKE some Fifty-three Thousand Men Idle-The Operatives Hold a

Loxpox, Nov. 7 England haw on Bater. day the beginning of what seems likely to be the greatest industrial fear that the country . has known in many years. Cotton mills employing 14,000,000 spindles were shut Cown: Of: the - 11,000,000 egindles run in England the mill owners have a masters' federation fa which 20,-000,000 spindles are represented. The owners of the 6,000,000 spindles still ranning will pay to the federation a fine of a farthing a spindle per week for such as they keep at work. There are about 24,-000 operative spinners grouped into varous local unions, all federated in an amalgemated association of cotton spinners. Their average carnings for a week of sixty hours are 32 shillings. The local unions combined have a reserve fund of £120,000. This will be further increased by the con-

tributions of four shillings a week from 9,000 members who will remain at work. Mr, Mandesley, secretary of the Amalgamated Association of Operative Cotton Spinners, thinks that 53,000 persons will be rendered idle by the lock out or strike, the trouble partaking of both features.
