THE NEW PUBLIC SCHOOL.

A Credit to the Board of Trustees, as well as the Architect and Contractors.

AN ORNAMENT TO THE TOWN.

Acton's fine new Public School building, rendered necessary by the increasing population, now completed and will, when the school furniture is placed, be ready for occupancy by the teachers and their pupils.

The building presents a commanding appearance. Its architectural prettiness, pleasing and handsome effect from all points of view.

The material of the building is first-class throughout and the workmanship superior. It rises above the ground level of underpinning, is built of heavy cut granite, free from stone, neatly pointed and very substantial in appearance.

The school is entered through a commodious open portico of artistic design into the vestibule by heavy paneled doors. From the vestibule the two school rooms on the ground floor are reached and also the first wide staircase leading through an arch to the upper rooms.

The wood work and trimmings exhibit very creditable workmanship and are carefully executed in every detail. All the rooms, the staircase and vestibule are supplied with neat wainscoting three feet high with moulded paneling.

An important feature of the new building is the heating and ventilation which has been very successfully arranged. In each chimney flue is a large air space, surrounding the stove flue. This effects a good draft and the foul air is drawn from each room through ventilating registers fixed at regular intervals at the floor.

The work throughout has been completed in a satisfactory and workmanlike manner. It is freely attested by local mechanics who have inspected the premises during the past few weeks.

What was probably the last sitting of the Council in the present year was held on Thursday evening last when the preliminary financial report was presented and ordered to be published as required by law. Before the business of the evening was completed all the members had taken their seats.

MR. MOWAT SUCCEEDS.

The Ontario Government Owns the Disputed Niagara Strip of Land.

One of the most elaborate judgments ever given at Osgoode Hall was delivered by Chancellor Boyd.

It was on the 10th of Dec. that the Ontario Government had leased a right of way for a tramway on the river bank to Howard and Wexford, American capitalists. The latter proposed to build a railway and elevator, along the Canadian side.

By this decision the authority of the Ontario Government is upheld. The Chancellor's order that the disputed land was never set aside for military purposes. The suit has been in progress since 1887.
