A Norwich druggist, was fined in October last for having allowed liquor to be drunk, by a customor, on the premises. The court. however, unanimously refused so to do holding that the druggists' act was violation of the Lignor Liscense Law. The judgment therefore means that liquor cannot, under any circumstances, be dropk in a drug store. 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
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
