Good roads enable the farmer to market his produce at all times, to take advantage of changes in market prices, and to utilize time that caunot be given to other farm work; they enable hun to market his produce and secure his supplies at less expense for hauling, with less wear and tear to vehicles. and with loss injury to animals. The imprevenent of rowls results in bringing more closely together the members of the agricultural community, and thereby increuses the social intercourse of farmers. In a word, the construction of better roads brings the farmers closer to their markets and closer to one another, the financial, social and moral advantages of which are well understood by all.

CANADA'S OFFER REJECTED.

The British Chambers of Commerc Do Not Approve of Preferential Trade With the Dominion.

Loxbox, March 21 .- The 33rd appear meeting of the association of Chambers of Commerce of the United Kingdom was held here to-day. One of the most important subjects before the chamber is that relating to British trade relations with Canada. Upon this question the Birmingham chamber of commerce introduced the following resolution :-"That as in the opinion of this meeting the future prosperity of British commerce must increasingly depend on our commercial relations with our colonies, and recognizing the fact that Canada has, by the resolution of her parliament, invited the mother country to enter into an arrangement for reciprocally preferential duties, we hereby urge upon the government the necessity of taking that invitation into their immediate and

most serious consideration." After considerable discussion the resolu tion in support of preferential duties in favor of Canada was rejected.




