The state of the s NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The sait of the Dominion Government in the Superior Court, Montreal, against Mr. Senecal, late superintendent of the Government Printing Bureau, to recover sums of money received by Mr. Senecal as commission on Government contracts, was dismiss ed by Judge Jette on Saturday, on the ground that the plaintiffs had not alleged any direct loss in connection with the

According to the estimates submitted. the Legislature, Ontario's expenditure will this year be \$86,948 in excess of that of last year. The estimated outlay for 189 was \$3,472,237, and that for 1893 is \$3,559, 185. The increase is chiefly in the items on capital account. The Government has interted a vote of \$100,600 to build the new asylum which the constituents of Mr. Frater have been claiming, and at last Brockville is to be in possession of an im portant public work.

Owing to the general failure of the potato crop of 1892 in the United States, that country is now importing large quantities of this vegetable from all parts of Europe We note almost daily imports from London, Bristol, Liverpool, Glasgow or Leith in the United Kingdom; and from Bremen, Havre, Antwerp, Hamburg or Rotter dam on the continent. The beavy duty of 25c. per bushel imposed by the McKinley tariff on this article of prime daily necess ity forms a heavy tax upon the industrial classes in the United States.

The local option by law was carried re cently at Grand Valley by the following vote :- For, 311 : against, 186 ; majority for the by-law, 125. If Grand Valley can carry the local option by-law with such a majority, there is no doubt it would be carried here without effort. Acton has never compromised berself with the liquor traffic by giving a vote against a measure calculated to curtail the sale and consump tion of intoxicating liquor. All that is within view shows that there is very little prospect of there being any advance in prices at present.

The law of Ontario provides that a person taking up any estray stock shall give notice of taking up by publishing a notice three times in a weekly newspaper, if one is published within the section where the estray is taken up, and if the property is not called for within three weeks after the first insertion of the notices the finder shall go to a justice of the peace and take oath to the finding and advertising. If the property is not claimed within one year, and should not exceed \$50 in value, it then belongs to the party taking the same up. If over \$50 it shall be advertised by the justice and sold, and the excess of all expenses shall be paid over to to the county treasurer. Any person taking up an estray and neglecting to cause the same to be ad vertised and appraised shall be liable to a fine of \$20.

A unique experiment is to be tried South Carofina. After July 1 no liquor or beer will be sold there legally except by the State, officers being already engaged in the work of getting the State bar-rooms ready for opening on that date. The liquor dealers are up in arms, but in the mean. time they do nothing but grin and bear. It long and expensive legal proceedings to test the constitutionality of the statute having to be gone through before they will know whether the State is acting swithin ite righte in passing such legislation. Four of the most eminent legal firms in the State advice the liquor dealers to prepare to meet the law as valid and constitutional Just what is to be gained by having barrooms run by the State instead of by individuale is not quite clear. It will be universally conceded that people can probibly get just as drank at a Government bar as they can at a private one.

HALTON RAILWAY CASE.

As was shown in last issue of the FREE Press the refusal of the Privy Council to hear the appeal of the Grand Trunk Railway against the decision of the Supreme Court brings the action to an end as far as the Railway and County are concerned. County Treasurer Campbell last week received the Company's cheque for \$84,622,50 and the balance of \$700 for interest accrued will shortly be handed over.

We think with the Champion that it is but just to the members of the Railway Committee of the County Council who contributed to the successful result of the action that their services in the interest of the county-or, more properly speaking, the group of municipalities assessed for the railway bonbs-should be recognized and fully appreciated. As is well known W. H. Storey Esq.; then the Reeve of Acton, was chairman of the Railway Committee from the inception of the case until his retirement from municipal office, and to him and his colleagues, Messre. Pettit, Dr. Buck, Dr. Robertson, Dr. Richardson and Geo. H. Kennedy much credit is due for the success of the case through its initial stages and until it reached the Supreme Court, since which time Dr. Buck has officiated as chairman of the Commiftee. Though Acton had no pecuniary interest in the outcome, no effort was spared in the prosecution of the case, which required considerable time and attention. During progress of this action there have been differences of opinion as to the merits of the case and the methods adopted to secure the courts. In some matters Mr. Storey

and the FREE Pares have differed very widely but in all fairness we think all are bound to admit that the case was conducted throughout in the best interests of all concerned and with credit to the County.
