NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The suit of the Dominion Government in the Superior Court, Montreal, against Mr. Renaud, late superintendent of the Government Printing Bureau, to recover some of the money received by the Bureau from the sale of Government contracts, was dismissed by Judge Jette on Saturday, on the ground that the plaintiff had not alleged any direct loss in connection with the contract.

According to the estimates submitted to the Legislature, Ontario's expenditures for the year 1921-22 are \$65,488,000 in excess of that for 1920-21. The estimated total for 1922 is \$62,472,237, and that for 1923 is \$63,503,361. The increase is chiefly in the items of capital account. The Government has inserted a vote of \$100,000 to build the new asylum which the commissioners of Mr. Frazer have been claiming, and at Brockville is to be possession of an important public work.

Owing to the general failure of the potato crop of 1922 in the United States, that country is now importing large quantities of the vegetable from all parts of Europe. We note almost daily imports from London, Bristol, Liverpool, Glasgow or Letch in the United Kingdom; and from Bremen, Havre, Antwerp, Hamburg or Rotterdam on the continent. The heavy duty of 25c per bushel imposed by the McKinley tariff on the article of potato tubers, has recently been raised to 75c by the tariff act which is to take effect on the 1st of June.

The local option bill was carried recently at Grand Valley by the following vote:—For, 311; against, 185; majority for the bill, 125. If Grand Valley carry the local option bill with such a majority, there is no doubt it would be carried there without effort. Acton has never compromised itself with local option by giving a vote against a measure calculated to curtail the sale and consumption of intoxicating liquor. For three consecutive sessions it voted against it. What has been done before can be done again, and the people of this community are in just about the right temper to carry local option and put it into effect with emphasis.

There appears to be very little change of any appreciable advance in wheat from now until the crop arrives, and it is the opinion of those well posted on the grain circles that wheat is now at the maximum that it will reach, at least for some time. There is plenty of wheat both in this country and other parts of the world. The World's wheat stocks on April 1, 1922, and 1921, are in the United States 2,136,535, 1,968,000 bushels for this year; and 2,833,000 for last year. In Europe and Asia, 69,704,000 bushels for this year and 81,256,000 for last year, and the grand total is 3,844,539 bushels against 3,834,755, 000 bushels in 1921 and 4,055,000, 000 bushels. All that is within a distance that there is very little prospect of there being any advance in price at present.

The law of Ontario provides that a person taking up any estate shall give notice of taking up by publishing a notice three times in a weekly newspaper, if it is published within the section where the estate is taken up, and if the property is not called for within three weeks after the first insertion of the notice, then the notice is a justice of the peace and take oath to the finding and advertising. If the property is not claimed within one year, and should not exceed \$50 in value, it then belongs to the State for the same term. If over \$50 it shall be advertised by the justice and sold, and the excess of all expenses shall be paid over to the county treasurer. Any person taking up an estate and neglecting to cause the same to be advertised and appraised shall be liable to a fine of \$20.

A unique experiment is to be tried in South Carolina. After July 1 liquor or beer will be sold there legally except by the State, officers being allowed to sell for the purpose of getting the State bar-rooms ready for opening on that date. The liquor dealers are up in arms, but in the meantime they do nothing but grizzle and howl, long and expensive legal proceedings, and the constitutional issue of the statute having to be gone through before they will know whether the State is acting within its rights in passing such legislation. Fear of the most eminent legal firms in the State advice the liquor dealers to prepare to meet the law as valid and constitutional. Just what it is to be advertised by the justice and sold, and the excess of all expenses shall be paid over to the county treasurer.

The following circular has just been issued by the Provincial Treasurer to the Inspectors of the Province:—"The Commercial Travellers' Association of Canada, a most influential and intelligent body of men, having a membership of nearly 4,000 men, who in the discharge of their duties have occasion to patronize many of the licensed taverns throughout the Province, has brought to the notice of this branch several matters that require your consideration and attention. It is represented that to not a few licensed hotels patronized by members of the association the outside closets and inside lavatories are in a filthy and unhealthy condition; that the sleeping apartments are indifferent in accommodation and kept in an unclean and slovenly manner; that the sample rooms are very poorly lighted, heated and ventilated. In every case are therefore instructed to inspect upon cases of complaint heretofore being removed, not only in the interests of the association and the travelling public but also to the general public generally. It will also be absolutely necessary, in view of the growing season, to see that the surroundings connected with the hotels in your district be kept in a good sanitary condition. HALTON RAILWAY CASE.

As was shown in last issue of the Free Press the refusal of the Privy Council to hear the appeal of the Grand Trunk Railway against the decision of the Supreme Court brings the action to an end and as far as the Railway and County are concerned. County Treasurer Campbell last week received the Company's cheque for \$84,622.50 and the balance of \$700 for interest accrued will shortly be handed over.

It is a simple device consisting of a cast-iron plate with a central hole and a small projection on one side. It is to be fixed to the rails and will prevent the wheels of the cars from coming off the rails.
