CLEAN CISTERS.

Care should be taken to keep cisterns clean. When water which is stagnant is kept for months in succession in the same cistern, it becomes to some extent impure, and there should be renewed occasionally. It is not sufficient to renew it, as it were, by running in fresh supplies. The water should rather be removed entirely at stated intervals, and these should be done sooner than once or twice a year. Even where no water can get into the cistern except what is caught upon the roof, the water will soon gather a large amount of dirt, particularly soot, from the smoke of the chimneys. In many places the waters of cisterns are a means to the health of the householders, more especially when they are used for drinking, and this not infrequently happens in sections where water is hard to get by means of digging or boring. Impurities often get into cisterns, even when considerable watchfulness is exercised. Vermis of various kinds find their way into them sometimes, and when they do the waters, of course, soon become offensive. If they can be drained and cleaned by an opening from the bottom, good and well; but in any case they should be occasionally cleaned.
