NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The Royal Commission on the Litigation of the will, it is expected, meet in Ottawa to conclude the hearing of evidence. This is the last session. It will last two or three days. The commissioners will then set to work preparing their report, which will probably be ready in a month.

It is reported that Mr. B. D. Macmillan, of Oakville, who was tendered the Halton County nomination at the Reform Convention a few weeks ago, has notified the president, Dr. McGregor, that owing to ill health he will be unable to accept it. A meeting of the delegates who were in Convention and nominated Mr. Macmillan will be held shortly to select a new candidate.

The English Radicals are furious because Mr. Gladstone formally abandoned the Employers' Liability Bill in the House of Commons without any abusive attack on the Lords. Mr. Gladstone announced that the amendments had destroyed the efficacy of the measure, and that the responsibility must rest with the Lords. His statement was calm, dignified and statesmanlike.

This Judicial Committee of the Privy Council gave judgment last Friday declaring the Ontario act respecting assignments and preferences by insolvent bankrupts to be valid. This reverses the judgment of the Supreme Court, which awarded in favor of the Dominion Government a victory in that legislation was *ultra vires* of the Province of Ontario.

The habit of practical economy, based on the people of this country, by the hard times still survive when prosperity comes again. A return has been presented to the Ontario Legislature that the total number of Reverses and Divorces comprised in the various institutions of Ontario in 1902 numbered 1,119, as against 1,093 in 1897. The amount paid as indemnity in 1902 was \$5,450, as compared with \$31,225 in 1897. The total amount of the assessment in the different counties for 1902 was \$601,471,168 as against \$401,706,000 in 1897. The rate on the dollar in 1902 averaged 1.08 for both the years named. Simcoe has the largest number of Reverses, with 34.

When the opinion of the Supreme Court was given in the Manitoba school case Mr. J. S. Ewart, Q. C., who is at present in England, called to the registrar of the Supreme Court asking that copies of the opinion of the judge be sent to him. This was taken to mean that Mr. Ewart proposed to appeal to the Privy Council, as the court has sent the copies to Mr. Ewart, and he has also made a report to the important Justice, Justice, for the answer as to the six questions submitted by the two men.

The subject of Mr. Gladstone's recognition is again raised in a way suggesting that they may be some foundation for the report. The *Times-Herald*, The *Saint John Gazette* and the *Montreal Gazette* publish articles almost identical in substance, indicating that Mr. Gladstone will resign as soon as possible. The reason given in each is that the Premier's strength is failing so fast that his vision will become wholly obscured if he does not immediately retire from active political duties. It is also stated that it was the intention of Mr. Gladstone to resign to his approaching retirement to the House of Commons. His resignation was discussed by his colleagues and done so.
