HARD TIMES BRINGS THOUGHTS OF BETTER LIVING.

Religious revivals always occur in times of unusual pain and distress. When men fail to have confidence in each other or in themselves they fall back on God.

God is the only one who can help us and he can put confidence alone in God. Such, indeed, was the history of all the very great religious awakenings or revival periods of this country. And now when the government itself is hard up and a big deficiency has just been discovered, to say nothing of the hard, panicky times prevailing everywhere, Moody and Bankey have begun at least a battle against the devil right at the seat of government. There is a striking coincidence about this fact. During the terrible winter depression of 1873-74, the greatest religious revival ever known in this country was carried on in all the great cities, and extended even to the most remote hamlets.

During the panic of 1873 and '74 another grandiose awakening began in New York and swept throughout the nation like a tidal wave. Moody and Bankey were at the head of it, and now twenty years later, when the times are fully as bad, these two evangelists propose an awakening both in Washington and throughout the nation in every section of America.
