NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The first-epoch report of the year was published last week in Winnipeg. It shows a total wheat crop of 1,010,100, and all crops 1,692,361, being an increase over last year of 39,312 acres. All correspondents report reasonable weather for seeding, and excellent condition of crops.

Three hundred members of the British Commons have given their written endorsement to the proposal made in the United States Senate that all disputes between Great Britain and the Republic shall, for the next twenty-five years be referred to arbitration. The breach made one hundred and twenty years ago is gradually being bridged over.

Various estimates have been made of the losses incurred by the coal miners as a consequence of the strike. According to the New York Times, the loss in wages will aggregate \$10,000,000, a sum which would take a year and a half to make up at the advance of ten cents a ton for mining. The Times adds: "This takes no account of the losses to labouring men in other industries dependent upon the coal supply for their continuance."

The steady advance in the price of wheat during the past week or so has impacted a healthier feeling all round, corn, oats, and provisions having shared in the upward movement, and should the steady gain in values continue, other branches of trade will no doubt sympathize and improve in proportion. The recent appreciation in the price of wheat appears to have been based upon a solid foundation, namely, the persistent shrinkage in supply as well as prospective shortage in the growing crop of the United States.

The United States Inspector of Immigration, Mr. O'Brien, has issued instructions to the agents of the New York Central, West Shore, Michigan Central, Rome, Watertown, Lehigh Valley, and Erie Railways that all persons in their employ at Suspension Bridge, N. Y., and residents there the Canadian side must travel on the American side or the railway must disgorge them. The railway companies have notified all immigrants to that effect, taking effect on July 1st. There are some seventy-five men so employed who have their families and live in their own homes on the Canadian side.
